MANY U. GRADUATES ON OTHER COLLEGE STAFFS

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Feb. 15.—Development of Oregon's institutions of higher education was not rapid until the last few years; yet the state has contributed considerably to the faculties of colleges and universities.

Of the University of Oregon alone 41 graduates hold instructional or other positions on the staffs of developing institutions.

Some of the institutions are University of Washington, University of Georgia, University of Denver, Washington State College, Vassar College, Kalamazoo College, Albany College, University of Wisconsin, Cornell University, Pennsylvania State College, and University of Idaho.

The positions held range from preceptors to fellowships; the departments to which they are assigned include engineering to fine arts.

Japs Want to Help
WASHINGTON, Feb. 15.—Reports said to have come from the Vienna foreign office reached Washington to the effect that the recent, special mission of the czar's cousin, Grand Duke Nicholas Mikhalovich, to Tokio had for its purpose the participation of Japan in the defense of the Suez and Asia Minor and that Japanese troops are landing at Vladivostok and proceeding overland from Port Arthur for actual service in these regions.

Their destination is believed by the report to be the Volga river, when they will be transported to the Caspian sea and thence to Asia Minor and Syria. This purpose of the movement is said in the report to be the blocking of an attack of the German forces on the Sinai Peninsula in the rear and the Japanese army of there are declared to be anxious to try conclusions with General Mauchasen and General von der Goltz in that section.

It is also said that Duke Peter George von Oldenburg, cousin of the ruler of the German principality of Oldenburg and brother-in-law of the czar, has tendered the use of his estates in the trans-Caucasian baronies and hospitals. The report is correct is regarded as signifying the movement of large bodies of troops into that section in the near future.

Reading Circle Course for the Teachers of Oregon.

The Umatilla County Library has purchased one copy each of the following books one of which must be read by each teacher who wishes to get a certificate this year. In sending to the library for them, it is best to state first, second and third choices as the one most preferred may be out at the time. It is also best to begin reading as early as possible as one is then more likely to get first choice. The following is quoted from the circular sent out by the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, "Be tween November 1, 1915, and November 1, 1916, no certificate may be registered with a county superintendent unless one of these books has been read. The county superintendent has entered into an agreement among themselves whereby they will take as evidence of the careful reading of one of these books, a certificate issued by the University of Oregon for any of the first thirteen books or a certificate from Oregon Agricultural College for any of the last six books. Teachers who read one of these last year should read a different book this year.
