**PLAGSTAFF, Ariz., Feb. 19.**—What appears to be the first spring thaw on Mars for this season has just been detected by the astronomers of the Lowell Observatory in latitude 34 degrees and longitude 245 degrees. The north cap itself is in active process of melting, a circular rift having appeared half way through it which is widening and which is connected with the border by radial tributary rifts. The cap is surrounded by a clear blue band like the tint of the vegetation markings.

**THERE WILL BE NO DEATHS IN MT. CARMEL IN 1929**

MOUNT CARMEL, Pa., Feb. 19.—The following statement was made to the United Press by W. P. Kemble, editor of the Mount Carmel Item:

"The department of commerce, bureau of the census, Washington, has just issued a bulletin of mortality statistics that show some surprising facts. The bulletin shows deaths and death rates in 1914, with comparative rates for recent years, for cities in the registration area that have 10,000 or more inhabitants.

**INDIAN AT CHICAGO SAYS SPANISH DANCER PROMISED TO BE HIS SQUAW.**

What Umatilla Indian, under the name of Chief Grey Eagle, is in Chicago hunting for a Spanish dancer who promised to be his squaw? Inquiry at the agency failed to reveal any Indian of that name known there, yet Clerk Barbour states that almost every Indian has several names which he doffs and dons as he pleases. Here is the story sent out in a Chicago dispatch:

A lone Indian brave in all his native regalia, stalked silently through the streets of Chicago today. Searchingly he scanned the faces of all the women he passed and anxiously he inquired at 50 different hotels if they had seen the woman who had promised to be a squaw. She was a tall, slender woman, he said, with dark, flashing eyes and light hair. She is a Spanish dancing girl from Argentine and her name is Leonora Suple. The Indian's name is Chief Grey Eagle. He is a Umatilla brave and comes from an Oregon reservation.
