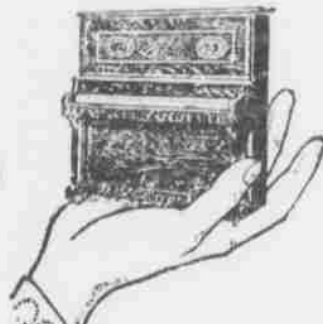

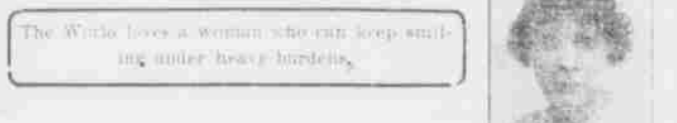

EASTERN OREGON TEACHERS REACH DECISION AT LA GRANDE MEETING.

A. C. Hampton who Saturday attended a meeting of the eastern Oregon superintendents and principals. This decision was reached in order that interscholastic games will not interfere with studies. The eastern Oregon track meet will be held at Baker this spring, accord-
