Hog Situation is Firm Feature With \$8.15 High Point

(Continued Sunday Journal)
PORTLAND, Ore.—The swine market secured a much more liberal showing of supplies at North Portland for the week but the trade's demand was somewhat better and a net advance of 10c is shown in values for the last six days' trade. On Monday for market advanced to \$8.25 for top hogs, but only one sale of selected stuff was made at this price and later in the week the price dropped to \$8.00 for quality stuff. On the closing day of the week some extra good stuff sold at \$8.15.

There were various reasons for the week's increase in hog offerings at North Portland. Chief, perhaps, was the fact that weather conditions had not recently permitted the usual amount of marketing and a greater supply of Willamette valley stuff came in abundance. On the other hand feed stuffs are getting scarce and high and this, too, was a factor in forcing valley shipments.

This increase in the marketing was due entirely to valley stuff. Eastern Oregon and Idaho hogs were in very scant offering during the six days and indications point to a general clean-up of the surplus of the interior.

Using Up the Valley.
Late indications have been that local livestock and packing interests are trying to build up the Willamette valley swine holdings to such a degree that this market will be independent of other sections if need be, although Portland will look to the interior for many years for a large portion of her requirements.

The one factor indicated in the attempt to build up the valley hog supplies is that this is Portland territory entirely and will be absolutely under control of the Portland market. On the other hand interior shippers can send their supplies to several markets.

side perhaps from the pulp fed stuff which usually brings extreme prices no matter what happens to the rest of the market.

Opinions expressed by various commission interests in their patrons reflect general weaker sentiment in the cattle market. For instance, Kidwell & Caswell say:

"Receipts of cattle were very light Monday about 21 cars all told. The demand was slack and prices a trifle lower than last week, excepting a few cars of pulp fed steers which sold at \$1.25, which is steady. Bulk of the sales of top hay fed steers were made from \$1.15@1.25, with a number of cars of medium steers selling from \$0.90@1.00. Very few cows and heifers coming; the demand is strong and prices steady, top in strong demand at from \$4.50 to \$5.25."

L. D. Bodine of the Sharkey commission company, says:

"As the roads have been cleared up since the big storm, we have had a fair run of cattle for this time of the year, consequently the packers have not been paying, since Monday, within 25c of the extreme top. The price of feed being so high they cannot afford to hold them. On Monday the extreme top on grain and pulp cattle was \$7.75. The same class of cattle on the market Tuesday brought only \$7.50. The common grades of cattle have been selling at former prices. We quote extreme top grain and pulp steers at \$7.50, extreme top hay fed steers from \$7.00@7.25, medium steers from \$5.50@6.00, common steers from \$4.75@5.00, extreme top cows and heifers, \$6.25, medium cows from \$5.75@6.00, common from \$4.50@5.00, grain fed bulls, from \$5.00@5.25, medium bulls from \$4.00@4.50, common bulls from \$3.00@3.50, extreme top light weight yearling calves, heavier calves from \$5.50@6.00."

Then again William Burke of the Burke Commission Co., reports:

"The receipts of cattle Monday amounted to 27 loads and the market at that time was fairly steady. Wednesday we had some eight or ten loads of cattle and the market was 15c lower than Monday. There were five or six loads on the market Thursday. The bulk of sales of our best hay fed cattle Monday sold at prices

A string of double wintered southern cattle sold for \$6.00 and half fat steers went to the feeders and killers at prices ranging from \$5.50 to \$6.50, and a piece of a load of cows sold yesterday at \$6.75. We sold a full load of cows at \$6.50. These were the highest prices obtained in the cow division this week."
