

Orange Delicious

- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup water
- 2 cups orange juice
- 1 cup cream
- Yolks 2 eggs
- 1 cup heavy cream
- 1/2 cup shredded candied orange peel

Boil sugar and water eight minutes, then add orange juice. Boil cream, add yolks of eggs, and cook over hot water until mixture thickens. Cool, add to first mixture with heavy cream beaten stiff. Freeze; when nearly frozen, add orange peel. Line a melon mould with Orange Ice, fill with Orange Delicious, pack in salt and ice, and let stand one and one-half hours.

DOCTOR SAILS WITH SNAKES.

South American Will Test Out Serum on Rabbits.

NEW YORK, Feb. 25.—Dr. Vitot Brazil sailed out of New York harbor with the following specimens from the Bronx Zoo:

- One Texas rattler.
- One diamond-backed rattler.
- One Gila monster.
- One water moccasin.

Dr. Brazil arrived in this country recently as a delegate to the Pan-American congress at Washington. Before returning to Rio de Janeiro he gave a serum of his own invention to the German hospital, which saved the life of John Toomey, a keeper in the Bronx Zoo, bitten by a rattlesnake on January 27.

Curator Raymond L. Ditmars, fearing the serum might not be successful against the bite of other snakes, collected four more deadly North American varieties and gave them to Dr. Brazil for experiment. Latin-American rabbits and guinea pigs will be put in the cage with them at Rio de Janeiro. The results will be shipped to the Bronx next month.

Booze Trickles in Bandon.

BANDON, Ore., Feb. 25.—After more than a month and a half of "dryness" Bandon, once said to be the wettest small city in the state, is converted to prohibition—almost. But the lid must be clamped on a little tighter.

"Booze" is evidently being distributed at dances by someone, but the authorities have not yet located the source. Little liquor has been imported via the common carrier route and the supplies laid in before the first of the year are supposed, in most cases, to be exhausted.

French hospital attendants have succeeded in impregnating rubber gloves with the salts of certain metals and making them impervious to X-rays for the protection of persons using the rays.
