Stockers-Feeders Expected to Move Better in Yards

PORTLAND, Ore.—Portland is becoming quite a shipping point for the distribution of stocker and feeder stuff. The advantages of this city as a marketing center for stockers and feeders have not been fully realized even by the local livestock trade, but it is expected that during the next few years that heavy gains in the stocker and feeder business will materialize at North Portland.

A load of cattle and a load of sheep were among the stocker stuff in the yards during the day. Both were en route to distant points; a

THOMPSON MAKES POOR SHOW IN PRIMARIES AT CHICAGO

CHICAGO, March 2.—The result of Tuesday's primaries show Mayor Thompson lost seven important wards. Two anti-Thompson candidates for aldermen were nominated. The mayor won only two of nine of the contests. In the democratic fight, Sullivan candidates won 27 of the 35 wards from the Dunne-Harrison group. Ninety thousand women voted.

Diamond is Given Tramp.
ST. LOUIS, March 1.—A third-clad and poorly shod but lucky tramp to whom Mrs. C. L. Knapp gave an old pair of shoes recently unquestionably is well fortified financially against cold and want these frigid days. In one of the shoes was a \$200 diamond ring and a garnet ring valued at \$60.

Mrs. Knapp had placed the rings in one of the shoes for safe keeping. A few days later a tramp appeared at the door and asked if she had any old footwear she might give him. Forgetting the gems, Mrs. Knapp presented the shoes to the man. He left. Tramp shoes and rings have not been heard of since.

Veteran of '46 is Dead.
SPOKANE, March 2.—Anson A. Pike, 96 years old, the last survivor of General John C. Fremont's army of conquest, who saw the Mexican flag hauled down in 1846 at what is now Los Angeles, died at the home of a daughter here. He was born at Sen, Brook, O., January 1, 1820. He was a stone mason and built the brick
