REDUCTION OF LAND PRICES STARTS NEW HERMISTON SALES

EFFORT IS BEING MADE TO HAVE IDLE LANDS ON PROJECT SETTLED.

New booklet describing New Methods of Raising Alfalfa, and Irrigating, Marketing and Feeding, is issued for Free Distribution; New Homesteaders are Wanted.

(East Oregonian Special.)
HERMISTON, Ore., March 4.—Land sales are increasing in this section with the opening of spring weather and the recent reduction of land prices. The Hermiston Commercial club has induced land owners to reduce their prices from the old time fruit boom values to a new basis in the interest of rapid settlement of the idle lands of the Umatilla project. A new booklet describing the methods of raising alfalfa, irrigating, harvesting, marketing and feeding, and the by-products of alfalfa has just been issued for free distribution and an effort will be made to attract home-seekers this spring.

The present prices offered range from \$25 to \$50 regulated by distance from town and conditions of tract offered. The same kind of land has been sold and held at \$100 to \$200 per acre, which has delayed settlement and improvement for years. But through repeated efforts of the citizens of the town and others not speculating in land these high values have been so reduced that men with small means can secure sufficient land for a good living and an income.

Dodd and Kennedy report the following recent sales: Ten acres to A. H. Larson for \$30 per acre; ten acres to F. B. Swartz for \$25 per acre; ten acres to C. E. Opal for \$25 per acre; twenty acres to A. Kerr for \$40 per acre; forty acres to H. M. Axtell for \$40 per acre; thirty acres to R. J. Arnold for \$50 per acre; forty acres to H. J. Hidy for \$40 per acre; eighty acres to M. S. Kern for \$40 per acre.

Work on the west extension of the Umatilla project will be resumed in a few days, there being concrete lateral ditches to be constructed before any of the ground will be thrown open to entry.
