10-YEAR OLD BOY OF HERMISTON KICKED ON HEAD BY HORSE

HERWIN SHOTWELL IS INJURED BUT IT IS NOT THOUGHT SERIOUSLY.

Hermiston High School Basketball Team is Defeated by Milton—Members of the Episcopal Church Listen to Interesting Address by Bishop Paddock Saturday.

HERMISTON, Ore., March 4.—Herwin Shotwell, ten year old son of Mr. and Mrs. J. K. Shotwell of this city, was kicked on the forehead by a horse Saturday morning. The heel of the horse which were known to be used at very opportune times were carefully avoided by the young lad but while hitching the animal to the rack it struck with its forefoot and cut young Shotwell just above the eye. A physician was summoned and while the cut is not serious, two stitches were necessary and temporarily was very painful.

The Hermiston high school basketball team, accompanied by Prof. A. T. Park returned home from their sojourn to Milton Saturday evening. Although defeated, the boys say they had a good game and pleasant trip.

In the first half of the game Hermiston had the better of their opponents by four points. In the last, however, Milton ran her score up to 11 while Hermiston was but 10. The following composed the team from this city: Gordon Shotwell, Chub Longhorn, Jas. Todd, Henry Gunn, Ernest Waterman and Cyril Blakeslee.

Library News

The report of the county library for February as given by the librarian at the monthly meeting of the library board is as follows:

Librarian's Report.
"The month of February has broken all records of circulation. For the second time the circulation has passed the 6000 mark. January was the first month to reach that point with 6155, and now February, the shortest month of the year and with the library closed two days during the storm, has exceeded that record with 6572 and a few branch records still to be heard from.

Another record is broken with the receipt last Saturday of the largest single book order since the county library started. About half of the order is made up of shorts in the November and December children's book orders which J. K. Gill was unable to furnish. The shipment contained 567 books.

January also broke a year's record of registration with 281 new readers written in to our books.

This month has also seen the inauguration in the grade schools of the groups of school room libraries—29 selected books in the fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh grades of the Lincoln, Hawthorne and Washington schools. The enthusiasm with which these books were received by both the teachers and the children and the splendid use made of them in the fifteen days since this work was started, is very encouraging. On the day the books were placed in the rooms, I explained the uses of the public library to the children, invited all to come to the library who had never done so and in return for the good books offered free to them, explained that we would expect them to be quiet and orderly in the library and help us to keep the books in good order on the shelves.

It has worked like a charm and we have never seen the books in such good condition on the shelves or quiet-

er children in the room, while more have come than ever before. I found that 134 children in grades four to seven in the three schools had never been in the public library. Within the fifteen days following, 26 of them have registered here and started to read while from the libraries placed in the schools, 326 books have been taken out for home reading.

Another way in which the library and schools can cooperate has been suggested by Mr. Hampton and is being looked after this week. The librarian has been asked to choose the children's books appertaining to the grade schools from the county school book funds. This amounts to \$124 worth of books and when received will be placed in the public library, classified, catalogued and circulated with the regular library books.

The Stanfield school is to be standardized this year and to meet the requirements must buy \$20 worth of books. Mr. Howard, the principal, has asked my help in selecting them and will come to Pendleton Saturday for this purpose.

One indication of the growing popularity of the library is in the number of people seen in the reading room. Yesterday at one time I counted thirty-one in the reading room and fifteen in the children's room and we have but forty chairs.

The state of Washington expects to put through a county library law at the next legislature and the matter is to be discussed at the Inland Empire Teachers' Association to be held in Spokane this spring. I have been asked to speak at that time, following the reading of the proposed new law by Mr. Fuller of the Spokane public library.
