Prison Official Stunned.
SALEM, Ore., March 7.—Frank J. Humphrey was appointed farmer at the penitentiary to succeed T. E. Cornelius. Humphrey hitherto has been assistant farmer at the prison.

Cornelius' removal came as a result of his reported harshness to prisoners under his charge, though Cornelius is said to blame Parole Officer Keller for his demotion. Between these two there has been a feud ever since Keller became parole officer. Governor Withycombe expressed himself as in accord with Warden Minto's action in removing Cornelius, who was appointed by the late Harry

Minto when he accepted the wardenship of the prison. He is a former chief of police of Salem.

Woman Sued for Alimony.
CEATTLE, Wn., March 7.—Unless Mrs. Mary Jane Wedgewood, 69 years old, pays \$25 alimony to her ex-husband, William Wedgewood, 64 years old, she will be punished for contempt of court, providing that she cannot show that she is unable to make the payment.

The Wedgewoods were married nearly 25 years ago. Mrs. Wedgewood recently obtained a divorce, custody of two children, title to a lodging house and 20 acres of land, but the court ordered her to pay her ex-husband \$25 a month alimony during the rest of his life.

Power Stock Is Bought.
ROSEBURG, Ore., March 7.—A deal was closed in Portland whereby A. Welch, formerly interested in the Douglas County Water & Light Company of this city, sold his stock to John Kierman, a Portland capitalist. The transfer of Mr. Welch's interests to Mr. Kierman also included half of the stock in the Seattle Light & Power company. The Deal Company is

capitalized at \$600,000. The new officers of the company are: William Pollman of Baker, president, J. E. Yeon, of Portland, vice president, and John Kierman, director and half owner. It is understood that extensive improvements will be undertaken.

Teacher Killed by Auto.
OAKLAND, Cal., March 7.—Miss Julia R. McCard, 61 years of age and one of the oldest teachers in the Oakland schools, was run down and almost instantly killed here by an automobile driven by Mrs. P. E. Hoar of Alameda.

Miss McCard had stepped into the street to board a car. She had been in instructor in local schools for 30 years.

Mrs. Hoar was arrested and booked on a charge of manslaughter. She was released on her own recognizance, pending a coroner's inquest.

Shipload of Fruit Sought.
EUGENE, Ore., March 7.—E. L. Goodell of New York and London, is in Eugene conferring with fruitgrowers in an effort to induce them to join in the cooperative plan to send a shipload of northwest fruit to European markets. Mr. Goodell broadens the plan to include shipments of dried fruits. A ship is to be chartered to carry the cargo.

He estimates that the shipment of a car of prunes will cost 3 cents as compared to 40 cents at present, and that a box of apples will cost 40 cents, instead of \$1 as at present.
