### THE EAST UNITED ON PREPAREDNESS PLAN

DR. C. J. SMITH, RETURNING FROM VISIT, DECLARES ALL BACK WILSON.

(Oregon Journal.) Dr. C. J. Smith, who has just returned from a two months' visit throughout the east, says the three things that most impressed him were the great sentiment for preparedness, the increasing Roosevelt talk and sentiment, and the great business activity, commencing at the eastern side of the Rockies and culminating in New York city.

"Preparedness is a current and favored topic of discussion throughout the east," said Dr. Smith. "There seems to be a general sentiment back of the program to put the United States in such position that the nation can maintain its position at any time in the face of any condition that might arise."

Preparedness is slogan. "People differ as to means and as to the extent to which we should go, but they seem to be generally behind the administration in its program of preparation."

"And speaking of the administration," continued Dr. Smith, "national democratic leaders believe that the coming national convention will be the shortest on record. The nomination of President Wilson will be, practically, a matter of routine."

"On the other hand, the republican leaders are at sea. They do not know what is going to happen at the Chicago convention. Every one is talking Roosevelt. Everyone wants to know what the people of the west think of him. And the belief is fast gaining ground that if Roosevelt is not the nominee of the convention, he will dictate the next republican nominee."

Business is gaining. "I was surprised at the great business activity of the east. When I was in New York it was estimated that there were 1,000,000 visitors in that city. The hotels are jammed. It is almost impossible to get a theater ticket unless you reserve 10 days in advance, or buy it of a broker at a big advance. Business men are all happy and optimistic. I cannot see how such a condition can prevail so generally in the east without having its effect on the Pacific coast and it is the general belief that this part of the country will soon share in the good times now being enjoyed on the Atlantic coast."

The large searchlights used by the General Electric Company for spectacular illuminating effects at the Panama-Pacific exposition have been sold to the Russian government.

Girls in Riot Injured. SHELTON, Conn., March 8.—One girl was injured and two others arrested and several persons were pelted with eggs and red pepper in riots and clashes between police and strikers here in connection with the strike of girls and women at the N. Bassett Corset Supply Company.

The strikers tried to prevent other employees from going to work. They threw things at those who persisted and also at the police who aided the attacked employees. One girl's head was gashed by a policeman's club. The crowd was dispersed. The strikers demanded an adjustment of wages.

## Doughnuts

That will remain moist. Every housewife who bakes her own bread knows that if a little potato is added to the sponge, the bread will not dry out so quickly. In this recipe potato is used to make doughnuts that will remain moist and fresh for several days.

## K C Potato Doughnuts

By Mrs. Nevada Briggs, of Baking School fame.

3 1/2 cups flour; 2 eggs; 1 cup sugar; 1 level teaspoonful K C Baking Powder; 1 teaspoonful salt; 1 teaspoonful mace; 1 cup cold mashed potato; 1 cup milk, or more if needed.



Sift three times, the flour, salt, spice and baking powder. Beat eggs with rotary beater, then still using rotary beater, gradually add sugar, then work in the mashed potato with a spoon and alternately add milk and flour mixture. Make a soft dough, roll into a sheet, cut into rounds, pinch a hole in the center with the finger and fry in deep fat.

Fat for frying should not be hot enough to brown the doughnut until it has risen. When the doughnut is dropped into the fat it sinks to the bottom. As soon as it comes up it should be turned and fried a few at a time while cooking. This recipe is excellent as they do not take the fat in frying and will stay moist for days.

### of mind, and it is seldom realized except by medical men, that they exercise profound influence on the health.

When the mind is anxious and disturbed all the functions of the body go wrong. The digestive system is especially disordered, and this gives rise to what is known as auto-intoxication, an exceedingly common condition.

### Soldiers in Riot.

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., March 8.—Passengers arriving on the liner Sonoma declared 1800 Australian recruits, demanding a six hour drill day, rioted at Sydney February 14. Damage estimated at five million dollars was done before the soldiers were dispersed and the leaders jailed. One was reported killed.

### 53 Per Cent Earned in Oil.

CHICAGO, March 8.—The Standard Oil Company of Indiana in 1915 earned 53.32 per cent on its outstanding \$20,000,000 stock, as compared with 21.98 per cent in 1914. This was revealed at the stockholders' meeting held at Whiting, Ind.

The company paid \$2,600,000 dividends, beside which the surplus was increased \$12,258,376, making the total \$26,793,940.

### Murders Family; Suicides.

LAWTON, Oklahoma, March 8.—Daniel Okane murdered his family of seven and committed suicide, following a quarrel with his father. He is believed to have been insane. Armed with a razor a hammer and a revolver he apparently went methodically through the house, slaying his wife, five children and his father and then shot himself.
