Harvey L. Hatley, of Spokane, will begin upon his duties as mixologist at the Delta tomorrow. He is an expert as dispensing soft drinks, having had much experience. George Hill, the proprietor, has already started making extensive alterations at his place of business.

Fee in Oratorical Contest.

Chester A. Fee of this city, who will be graduated in June from the University of Oregon, has entered the Falling-Beekman oratorical contest which is one of the annual commencement features. The winning of the Falling prize receives \$150 and of the Beekman \$100.

Snow Mount Disappears.

After having survived for more than a month the big snow mountain piled up at the intersection of Court and Main during the early February snow by the employees of the First National Bank, today vanished entirely from sight. The thaw and rains and the blamy air attacked it and forced it to give way slowly, and the sun of the past two days finished the rout. Yesterday only a trace remained and today there is not even a wet spot left. However, in shaded spots there are still banks of snow remaining.

"Til" Taylor Written Up.

Sheriff "Til" Taylor of this county is the subject of a sketch on the "Interesting Westerners" department of the March number of the Sunset magazine which has just been received here. The article is from the pen of Fred Lockley and is illustrated by a splendid photo of the sheriff astride his fine saddle horse. The sketch, written in the style of an interview with an old time republican warhorse, deals with his efficiency as a catcher of criminals, his popularity as a vote-getter and his success as head of the Round-up.

To Build Toll Gate Road.

According to C. A. Galloway of Elgin, one of the Union county commissioners, the road from Elgin to Weston through Toll Gate will probably be built during the coming year. Mr. Galloway states that Union county will build her end of the road, spending \$15,000 or \$20,000 to secure a good grade. At present the road in use in Union county is a toll road and not under the jurisdiction of the county court. The road coming out at Weston will connect with the macadam highway there. Mr. Galloway does not think the proposed bond issue in Union county will carry this year.

Would Copy Our Natatorium.

In a letter received this morning from Orpheus C. Soots, secretary of the Walla Walla Commercial Club, the Pendleton Commercial Association is asked to send all data possible upon the cost, construction and maintenance of the public natatorium in this city. The letter sets out that a move is on foot in Walla Walla for the construction of a public swimming

pool to cost about \$10,000. Another letter relative to the local natatorium was received this morning by Secretary Cranston from La Roy W. Allison of Newark, N. J., asking for specific details regarding the construction of the pool. Mr. Allison is preparing an article on Pendleton's natatorium for an engineering magazine.

Mrs. Myrick Very Ill.

Mrs. James Myrick of Athena, has been brought to St. Anthony's hospital and is quite ill. Owing to her illness the case of Myrick vs. Myrick, in which she is involved, has been postponed.

The case of Dott vs. Campbell, involving the legality of a lease which plaintiff claims contains a clause inserted through a mutual mistake, was tried today before Judge Phelps. All of the testimony was taken and argument will be made Tuesday.

McCourt Speaks Tonight.

Hon. John McCourt, president of the Oregon republican club, arrived in Pendleton this morning and will be the principal speaker at the organization of the Young Men's and Young Women's republican club at the court house tonight. Indications are that there will be a big crowd out to hear Mr. McCourt speak.

Kyle Files for Office.

James M. Kyle of Stanfield yesterday filed as a candidate for nomination as public service commissioner on the republican ticket for the eastern Oregon district. He promises, if elected, to perform his duties fearlessly and impartially in the interest of all the people and selects this for his slogan "Encourage capital. Regulate should it become oppressive."

Better Babies Special Service.

Rev. H. H. Hubbell of the Christian church announced today that special services will be held on Sunday evening at his church in observance of "National Baby Week." Dr. T. M. Henderson will be the principal speaker on the subject of "Better Babies." Other churches are also planning special services.

for the support of the county schools be materially increased. They specifically endorsed a three mill general county tax for school purposes which would provide about double the funds now received. The present tax is \$19 per capita for school children where as a three mill general tax would be equivalent to \$20 per capita approximately.

There are about 75 directors from over the county in attendance at the meeting which is being held at the Presbyterian church, Supt. I. E. Young is presiding. Among the other questions discussed this morning and early this afternoon were "The School Budget," "The High School Tuition Fund," "Qualification of Teachers" and "The County Unit of Administration." Regarding the latter question the general sentiment was opposed to this plan which provides for all of the schools, excepting those in first class districts, to be placed under a single board.

Supt. E. J. Klemme of Ellensburg is addressing the directors this afternoon.

treasurer at the last city election, is also being mentioned.
