Portland's Market Makes Basis Price for Coast Stocks

PORTLAND, Ore.—From the standpoint of the producer and shipper, this has been a very interesting week in the livestock trade at North Portland. Portland is the chief market for livestock on the coast and every day this fact is being driven home to producers and shipping interests.

Portland makes the price of livestock with actual sales according to supply and demand, while some of the other markets are content to buy and then follow with similar changes even though no actual sales can be confirmed.

This city, by reason of its location, stands supreme in the livestock trade of the western slope of the United States and while no market is perfect all the time, the shipper to this

city secures values adequate with various conditions. It is mighty easy to claim sales are what count and in this regard the Portland market gives better net returns than any in the field at this time.

Swine Trade Excited.
 With actual sales as high as \$8.69 of a new high record for the present movement, and indications pointing to still greater advances, the market for hogs is about all that anyone could expect.

Advances have not only been rapid and sure here recently, but a similar condition has been shown throughout the American livestock markets. Receipts of hogs have been extremely disappointing at all points. This is equally as true of the east as of the west and even the extreme prices have failed to bring forward additional supplies. The theory is rapidly gaining ground that perhaps after all the holdings of hogs in the country are far less than expectations. The low prices have stimulated

consumption to a very remarkable degree and in some parts of the country these low values have caused many to quit the raising of swine.

The pendulum of prices is now swinging to the upward reaches of the hog market just as it swung to the lower levels some months ago. After all the markets are nothing more or less than the question of supply and demand. There may be

periods of limited duration when a market may be manipulated either up or down by buying interests, just as the demand meets the supply with adequate values.

Cattle Prices Are Litled.
 Reflecting entirely the shortage of cattle in the country and the sharp movement to markets, was the sharp advance in the price of cattle at North Portland during the week. Receipts continue limited with the percentage of real good quality animals limited. Top painted stuff sold in the steer division at the start of the week at \$7.90 or fully 20c better than similar quality offerings were bringing during the previous week. which stock was later put on feed here, there would be practically no arrivals in the market at this time for weeks past for the greater bulk of the arrivals in the mutton and lamb trade have been brought forward direct by killers.

For the limited amount of stuff offering on the open market only higher values are being offered. Top lambs are easily worth \$9.25 and some would forecast \$9.50 for the coming week. Other lines are quoted strong in proportion.
