Smuts Reports Advance.

LONDON, March 14.—Lieutenant-General Jan Christian Smuts, commanding the colonial expedition against German East Africa, has reported the occupation of Taveta and also of Sabatia. It was officially announced. The statement says some Germans with a machine gun surrendered, and that "operations are continuing."

The scene of the operations in East Africa is on the northern frontier between the German and British colonies. Taveta is on the British side of the line.

Churchill Back to Fight.

LONDON, March 14.—Colonel Winston Spencer Churchill, who had an interview with Premier Asquith finally has decided his place is with his regiment, according to Reynolds Weekly.

Colonel Churchill, the newspaper adds, is understood to have left for France early this morning.
