Expects War With Japan.
 BERLIN, March 13.—Germans believe the next great war will be between the United States and Japan, with Holland possibly on America's side.
 "Nowhere in America, except perhaps along the Pacific coast, is there such lively discussion of a Japanese-American conflict as there is in Germany. The Germans believe war between the two is inevitable because Japan wants the Philippines and is restless under American immigration and anti-Asian laws.
 Recently when the Lusitania case was reported critical, Berlin newspapers printed a dispatch that Japan had sent the United States an ultimatum demanding that Japanese be allowed to own land in America without restriction.
 Immediately after that it was reported America would "back down" on the Lusitania stand.
 A German officer said: "Germany is going to sell Japan all the munitions it wants if Japan and America go to war."
 Holland's interest in the situation is said to be based on a fear that Japan may seize Java and other Dutch East Indian possessions.

War Aids Stock Raising.
 WASHINGTON, March 14.—The war has stimulated the raising of farm animals in the United States, as shown by a report from the bureau of crop estimates. There was an increase in the number of all such animals last year, except horses and sheep.
 The number of horses January 1 according to these estimates, was 21,166,000, valued at \$2,159,468,000; as against 21,195,000 in 1915, value, 4,367,869, valued at \$319,800,000, compared with \$4,478,000 a year ago; milk cows, 21,988,000, valued at \$1,387,112,000, as against 21,282,000 last year; sheep, 49,157,000, valued at \$234,244,000, compared with 49,856,000 last year.

Hay Scarce in Garfield County.
 POSENEROY, Wash., March 14.—Haymows have been as depleted as a result of an unusually hard winter, according to reports from many of the farmers, that the supply for teams plowing summer fallow land will run short on some of the farms. As yet the pastures are a little to poor to attempt feeding by turning their horses out.

 PORTLAND, Ore.—Nine dollar hogs made their appearance in the North Portland yards for the first time this season at the week's start. Sales of top quality were made at the extreme mark early in the trading with a run only fractionally in excess of the small showing of last Monday morning.
