### Noted Resort City "Dry."

CORPUS CHRISTI, Tex., March 14.—Nueces county, one of the most populous in Southern Texas, voted for prohibition in a local option election. Forty-three saloons, chiefly in Corpus Christi, a tourist resort city which has been the stronghold of the "wet" faction, will be abolished by the election. The total vote was 1770 for prohibition, 1544 against. The country vote overcame an anti prohibition majority of 219 returned in Corpus Christi.

He will take messages to Donald H. MacMillan and his party, inbound in Etah, Greenland and to Dr. E. O. Hovey of the relief expedition at North Star Bay, off the Greenland coast.
