VILLA STOPS TRAIN TO SEARCH FOR AMERICANS

EL PASO, Tex., March 24.—Garcia Flores, a Spanish merchant of the city of Chihuahua, who arrived here said that Francisco Villa had held up a train on which he was traveling at Moctezuma, 35 miles northeast from Nantiquipa, where the Carranza authorities have insisted the bandit chief was located. Flores is well known in business circles in El Paso. "We were traveling north from Chihuahua City," he said, "and were

nearing the Moctezuma when we encountered a large force of men, mounted and on foot, surrounding the station. There must have been 1500 in all.

"When we reached the station we were amazed to see Pancho Villa himself enter the train. We had supposed he was many miles to the west. He walked through every carriage, declaring that he was searching for Americans and that he would kill any he found. I am not fighting Mexicans," he announced, "except the first chief and those traitors with him who have turned Mexico over to the Americans."

"Villa stopped to chat with some friends of his who were on the train. He told them that General Herrera had joined him three days ago with 2000 men, fully equipped and armed, who had followed him from Chihuahua City. He finally left the train without molesting anyone, but he took some supplies which he said he needed badly."

near Mullins, 65 years old, was killed by an explosion while grubbing new land near his home. Three ribs and his right arm were broken. The right side of his face was badly lacerated.

The injured man lay in the field unconscious from 10 a. m. to 2 p. m. before he was discovered. His son, William Wallace, and neighbors called Dr. Mount of Oregon City, and Dr. Dedman of Canby, but he died soon after.

SERIE MEDIATORS ARE BEING TAKEN TO CENE

SEWARD Alaska, March 24.—J. A. Moffet, B. M. Squares and Hyckell Davies, members of the Mediation and Conciliation Commission, appointed by the department of labor to settle the wage dispute between the Alaska Engineering Company and workmen employed on the construction of the government railroad arrived from Seattle.

Chairman Moffet said the commission would leave over the trail for Anchorage today. Three of the best men (log teams) at Anchorage have been sent to convey the commissioners from the end of Mile 24 to the construction camp. The commission conferred today with R. J. Weir engineer in charge of the government work here.

The labor trouble at Anchorage began February 7, when 60 track layers quit because their demand for in-

creased pay from 37 1-2 cents an hour to 50 cents an hour was rejected. A federal labor union was organized at Anchorage, with more than 600 members and a general strike called to enforce a minimum wage of 50 cents an hour.

Upon the recommendation of President Samuel Gompers of the American Federation of Labor, the men went back to work pending a settlement of the wage dispute by the arbitration commission.

Peace Conference Rumored.
 LONDON, March 24.—Agents of the Turkish and Bulgarian governments have arrived at Berne for the purpose of starting peace negotiations there, according to a dispatch received here by the Central News agency.
