THE GREATEST UNDERGROUND DEPTH.

Considering that the diameter of the earth is 8000 miles, we can only scratch the surface.

One of the Lake Superior copper mines has reached a depth of 4575 feet; the spereberg shaft near Berlin is 3810 feet deep; the Schladebach mine near Merseburg, Germany, has gone down 5528 feet and the Paruschowitz mine in Silesia had to give up operations after 6000 feet had been reached.

The gigantic ropes can barely carry their own weight after they reach a depth of 6000 feet; and are unable to carry a carriage besides. Moreover, mining entails a turning of diamond or other drills, and no power has been discovered to turn a drill at a greater distance than 6000 feet; and even then several hours are required to give the drills a turning movement.

So far all delvings into the ground have had a commercial objective; but the Austrian government has promised scientists to allow them to exploit, after the war, the Silesian mines for scientific purposes.

10 Homes Drop Into Hole.
WILKESBARRE, Pa., March 25.—When a cavern occurred in the workings of the Law Shaft of the Pennsylvania Coal Company at Avoca, early in the morning, ten homes dropped into a yawning cavern, extending a block along Valentine street.

Dog Saves "Frat" Men.
LA FAYETTE, Ind., March 25.—"Bob," the bulldog mascot of the Sigma Phi Epsilon Fraternity of Purdue University, saved the lives of 24 members by arousing them when the house caught fire early one morning recently.

The two lower floors of the building were in flames when the men were awakened by the dog. With the exception of one student, who was overcome and later rescued by firemen, all of the fraternity men escaped down the fire escapes.

The loss on the building, which was destroyed, and contents was estimated at \$15,000.
