IRRIGATION SEASON OPENS ON APRIL 1 ON UMATILLA PROJECT SAYS WATER SUPERINTENDENT

 HERMISTON, Ore., March 25.—According to M. D. Scroggs, superintendent of the distribution of the government irrigation water on the Umatilla project the irrigation season will open April 1st. Owing to the late rains and the great amount of moisture from the heavy showers practically no water has been required thus far. For the past two weeks water has been running in the Maxwell ditch, part of which has been used by the early seeders of alfalfa and grain.

condition to ship, but the lack of a proper demand for this class of stuff prevents it from being shipped to cause shippers to withhold shipments for awhile.
