Pendleton Bucks are Defeated by Colored Tigers

FIRST GAME PLAYED YESTERDAY; FINAL SCORE IS 9 TO 8 FOR TIGERS.

The Pendleton Bucks took their first defeat yesterday in their first game, the Pendleton Colored Tigers

coming out of the melee with the marginal end of a 9-8 score. The game for some seven and a half innings looked like an easy victory for the Bucks but the colored boys made a whirlwind finish.

All of the Bucks scores were made in the fourth and fifth and the score stood 3 to 1 until the eighth when the Tigers proceeded to murder the globe. They clouted the ball so hard that they managed to nose out a victory.

With the town of Turner divided into two factions for the last two years as the result of a bitter controversy over the installation of a city water system, the clash Saturday night is declared to be merely the culmination of the feud which has been growing more tense ever since the faction known as the "wets" won in the courts over the "drys."

The battle, resulting in three men being dangerously stabbed and at least 20 others sustaining severe cuts or bruises, has only served to accentuate the bitterness heretofore existing, and further trouble is not unexpected.

Apparently in fear of bodily harm R. O. Thomas, mayor, went into hiding Saturday night and efforts to locate him failed.
