Check Worth \$70,703,000.
NEW YORK, April 7.—A check for slightly more than \$70,703,000, said to be the largest ever drawn, passed through the New York clearing-house. It was made by J. P. Morgan & Co. on a local bank to the order of the Canadian government in payment of \$75,000,000 par value 5 per cent bonds, recently purchased by a syndicate of bankers.

Three Britishers Sunk.
LONDON, April 7.—Sinking of three British steamships was reported. One, the Ashburton, 4445 tons, unarmed, was destroyed by shrapnel shells fired by a German submarine. Five of her crew have been taken to a hospital.

The others were the Gold Mouth, 7416 tons, and the Achilles, 7042 tons. The crew of the Gold Mouth, two suffering from injuries, were landed at Penzance.
