Hay Supplies continue Short for needs

Small Offerings Greedily Snapped Up at High Price

PORTLAND, Ore., April 11.—Small supplies of hay are reaching the market, but the scramble for offerings is no excited and keen that even the larger handlers are still without adequate holdings to fill their daily orders.

While some relief is expected in the situation during the next week or 10 days when some of the California stock pens in appearance, the present season is acute.

Wholesalers are freely offering \$21 @ 25 a ton for eastern Oregon fancy timothy, as well as best quality alfalfa, but even this price is not able to draw supplies in this direction.

California alfalfa has been ordered here and can be landed at \$19 a ton with oat and wheat hay from the same state at \$18 @ 19 a ton.

Wheat market continues extremely quiet at Pacific northwest points. There is little trading in the country and the erratic tops of the general world's trade is causing dealers to go rather slow in their bidding.

Broomhall cabled from Liverpool that wheat was dull and under pressure of lower American cables, liberal world's shipments to the United Kingdom and increasing stocks, spot wheat easy, 1 to 2¢ lower. Cargoes easy, winters 10-12¢, and Manitoba is lower floating quantity, keeps buyers conservative. Pink Salmon Sells at 85 Cents Dozen

PORTLAND, Ore., April 11.—Pink salmon is in such extraordinary demand and supplies so scant at Pacific coast as well as at eastern centers, that prices are still moving upward.

A big northwest broker who secured the output from several of the big canning concerns, was offering pinks during the day at 85¢ a dozen to jobbers, compared with opening sales around 55¢.

Europe continues a liberal bidder for pinks and other of the cheaper grades of canned salmon and as total holdings are scant and then badly scattered, it is easy to see the full strength of the present market situation.

On the other hand the movement of No. 1 canned Columbia river spring pack chinook is extremely slow, although there is more or less movement toward the east from day to day.

The rush to the Alaska waters continues and within a few days practically all interests will have their boats en route to the northern canneries.
