Wheat Damage Reports Are Not Taken Seriously

Loss, However, Has
Been Confirmed in
U. S.; Farmers Hold

PORTLAND, Ore., April 13.—Chicago market was generally strong during the early day's trading for wheat with price advances, but the trade is still of doubtful character.

Damage reports continue to come from the big wheat growing sections of the central west, but as yet the trade is seemingly ignoring most of these reports. This is especially true of the European buyers and the latter are in for a big surprise before long because there is not the slightest doubt that the American crop has been badly damaged and will fall heavily below the production of a year ago.

In the Pacific northwest the bidding by eastern interests is somewhat better. Slightly higher prices are being offered at country points, but the movement is still greatly restricted because of the continued holding tendency of producing interests.

Broomhall cabled from Liverpool that the crop summary is generally favorable.

Liverpool wheat steady on Winnipeg strength, but later eased with receipts liberal. Spots unchanged. Manitoba cargoes opened 30 higher, but later eased. Winters unchanged and Platts not offered. American damage reports are offset by continued liberal local offerings, large foreign offers and large American stocks.
