Over 7000 Voters on Registry books

TOTAL NUMBER OF WOMEN WHO REGISTERED FOR PRIMARIES IS 3617.

The total number of voters in Umatilla county registered for the primary election is 7367, according to Registration Clerk Frances Saling who completed her totals yesterday. Two years ago there were 6747 registered for the primaries.

Of the total number registered 4580 are republicans and 2395 democrats with the remaining divided as follows: progressives 20, socialists 124, independents 11, prohibitionists 116, no party 20 and Whig one.

The total number of women registered is 3617. There are more than 10,000 voters in the county which means that the are about 3000 who did not register. The last week of registration was a lively one, 2143 appearing to register.
