GENERAL TOP FOR HOGS REMAINS AT \$9 IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Ore., April 27.—While occasional sales of swine are shown above the \$9 mark at North Portland, where the stock is either good or extra select quality, or has no additional freight charge to other markets, the general tone of the market here is steady at \$9 for what is ordinarily called top quality.

There was only a small run in the yards over night, and most of those were from local points.

FALL SOWN WHEAT IS IN EXCELLENT SHAPE

PORTLAND, Ore., April 27.—Following is a summary of the crop conditions in Oregon for the week ending April 25, as reported to the local office of the weather bureau by special correspondents throughout the state:

Unusually cool and showery weather prevailed the fore part of the week. The latter portion was milder, but with an excess of cloudiness, and all vegetation made slow growth.

In the central counties, where dry farming is practiced, it was windy on several days and the nights were cool, consequently growth there was slow, notwithstanding the soil is comparatively well moistened.

Fall sown wheat is in excellent condition, and pasture on the ranges has made satisfactory growth. Range stock are gaining flesh rapidly. Spring wheat seeding is nearly finished. That sown early is coming up slowly and looks thrifty and promising.

Excellent progress has been made with summer fallowing, and some farmers have finished plowing. Gardens and potatoes are backward, and some of the bottom lands have not yet been planted on account of the soil being too wet to work. Upland farm work is further advanced and the crops on this land, while healthy and promising, made little advancement during the week.

Fruit bloom is heavy in all sections and in the southern counties the early fruit has, from all appearances, set well. There was one heavy frost during the week, but the damage was not general, as in the localities where the most fruit is raised there was a light fog in the early morning which protected the crop from too rapid thawing and thus greatly lessened the damage.

The number of liquor licenses issued in all of the five boroughs of Greater New York last year was about 12,000. The state's share, net revenue, was around \$5,000,000; the city's about \$5,700,000.
