European Wheat Crop Will be Short
England Only One of Nations That Have Not Suffered

PORTLAND, Ore., April 28.—There was a slightly higher price for wheat options at Chicago when the market opened but later some weakness developed and the early gains were lost. Liverpool market for spot wheat ruled unchanged but there was a noticeable steadiness in the general foreign situation.

Perhaps of most special interest to the local trade is the announcement made during the day by the French government that it had corrected its report on the condition of the winter wheat crop from 87 per cent to 69 per cent. This indicates almost a crop failure in that country and much of the same sort of reports are being received from other European countries.

While there are liberal stocks of wheat on hand at English ports, the rest of Europe is famine-stricken and if shipping facilities are obtainable these countries will at once enter the market for supplies and not only entirely clear up the present accumulating surplus at English ports, but actually make new purchases.

Locally the situation remains extremely quiet, even the leading exporters not showing any special inclination to take hold of additional supplies at the moment.

Oats and barley market, while quiet, continue on a firm basis in the interior.

CATTLE MARKET IS STEADY; PULP STUFF SHOWING SCARCITY

PORTLAND, Ore., April 28.—With the exception of a small volume, practically all the arrivals of livestock at North Portland over night came from the Willamette valley in small lots.

Market for cattle is generally showing a steady tone. Pulp fed stuff is not in evidence, and is extremely scarce. Offerings of the best quality of such feeding would find immediate bids at \$9, as recently, but the best grain fed stuff would not rule above \$8.85, and the best hay steers at \$8.75. These prices differ little from those in effect of late.

LAST YEAR'S PRICE FOR CANNED SALMON EXPECTED BY TRADE

PORTLAND, Ore., April 25.—In all probability the price of Columbia river canned Chinook salmon will open either at last season's prices or a fraction higher. These are the indications at the moment. While some of the packers are in favor of a slight advance in last year's opening price owing to the fact that practically everything that is utilized in the canning business costs more money than a year ago, most of the packers are seemingly willing to retain the 1915 values.

Already some of the leading packers have sufficient advance orders for the 1916 pack at opening prices to more than take care of their usual output. However, there is a rather liberal carry over from the 1915 season.

There is every expectation among the trade for a short pack of the cheaper variety of salmon and this is likely to be an aid toward marketing a greater volume of the better quality goods. Aside from the No. 1 quality Columbia river chinook salmon, there is practically no carry over in the canned fish trade and this gives promise of a better market during the coming season which opens along the Columbia and Willamette on May 1.

RANGERS TO CARRY A TWO-AND-A-HALF POUND TELEPHONE

INSTRUMENT IS MADE OF ALUMINUM AND WILL BE USED THIS SEASON.

A portable telephone, made of aluminum and weighing 2 1/2 pounds, designed by a Forest officer, R. B. Adams of Missoula, Montana, will be part of the regular equipment of patrolmen on the national forest during the coming field season. In fact, one hundred of these instruments have already been received in Portland and will be distributed for use this summer on the government forests of Oregon and Washington.

This instrument is regarded as a great improvement over the set formerly used, which weighed ten pounds. It is said that a field man equipped with this new telephone, a few yards of light emergency wire, and a short piece of heavy wire to make the ground connection, can cut in anywhere along the 29,000 miles of more or less forest service telephone lines, and get in touch with the headquarters of a supervisor of a district ranger. To talk, one end of the emergency wire is thrown over the telephone wire, the two ends are connected to the portable instrument, and the instrument is connected to the ground wire, the end of which must be thrown into the damp earth or into water. Contact with the line wire is made possible by removal of the insulation from a

few inches of the emergency wire. The Adams instrument does not ring the bell of the receiving telephone, but instead causes a screaming sound from a small megaphone-shaped apparatus known as the "howler."

Thorough tests of the instrument have been made this spring on both the Cascade and the Whitman National Forests of Oregon, and the results were very satisfactory, even on a hundred-mile stretch. Forest officers say that these portable telephones will be especially valuable in reporting fires and other emergencies, and will supplant, in many ways, the regular telephones installed at lookout points and ranger stations.
