Northwest Wheat Market is Steady

Little Change is Shown in Prices Through Section

PORTLAND, Ore., May 1.—Trade in the local wheat market was at low ebb for the week but some fair business was done on the quiet in the interior at steady prices. Locally there was little change in the price of wheat as compared with the closing of last week, the situation in general being considered steady.

Foreign situation is quiet with practically no change in the Liverpool cash market for the week although toward the close there was a slight improvement in the cargo situation.

Crop conditions all over the world are being eagerly scanned by the trade. European crops are much less favorable but some improvement is noted in the American situation with improved weather.

LITTLE CHANGE SHOWN IN LIVESTOCK MARKET

PORTLAND, Ore., May 1.—Little change in general has been shown in the livestock trade at North Portland for the week. Receipts of sheep and calves were greater than last week, but cattle and hogs were in smaller supply.

Hogs generally ruled around \$9 for top stuff during the week. At this price the bulk of the top quality arrivals moved freely, while some exceptional quality stuff and some freight free stuff sold to outsiders and small butchers at fractional advances as during the previous week.

MONTANA WOOL SOLD AT 35 CENTS POUND

BOSTON, Mass., May 1.—Prices of domestic wool continued to show further advances, although Boston buyers have hesitated owing to the figures of the growers. The feature was the sale of 200,000 pounds of Ohio fleeces at an advance of a cent. The prices ran from 32 cents to 39. One Boston house paid 35 cents for several Montana freak clips of extra grade.

A little buying has been done in Washington and Oregon on the basis of a clean landed cost of 73 to 75 cents for staple. Scattering clips have been taken in Nevada and Utah at a clean landed cost of 72 cents.

Despite the lack of American competition, prices at London sales continue to be firm and this has induced a little more buying in the west. Among sales here in original bales were 300,000 pounds Montana at 30 cents and 25,000 pounds half blood Utah at 25 cents.

Less foreign wool has changed hands owing to reduced stocks. South Americans have brought around 40 cents in the grease and a few lots of cleaned Australian as high as 57 cents. Two boats brought South American wool this week, the domestic arrivals being 3,528,999 pounds, and the foreign 4,799,624 pounds.

WINTER WHEAT IS LESS THAN SEASON OF 1915

WASHINGTON, May 1.—It seems fairly well assured, according to a special committee of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, of which A. W. Douglas, of St. Louis, is chairman, that the winter wheat production this year will be appreciably less than that of 1915 and 1914. In fact, according to this prediction it will be below the ten-year average of the decade 1906-1915, approximately one-third less than the harvest of 1915, or roughly speaking, around 450,000,000 bushels. The committee declared there was approximately at the time of its survey, April 8 of this year, 20 per cent less acreage stand-

BUTTER MARKET DROPS DOWN ONE CENT TODAY

PORTLAND, Ore., May 1.—There will be a general decline of 1c a pound in the price of creamery butter in the Portland and Puget sound markets Monday. This will place the price of best prints or extras at 29c a pound and cubes at 28c for best. The price of No. 1 butter will be 27c and No. 2 will be at 25c a pound.

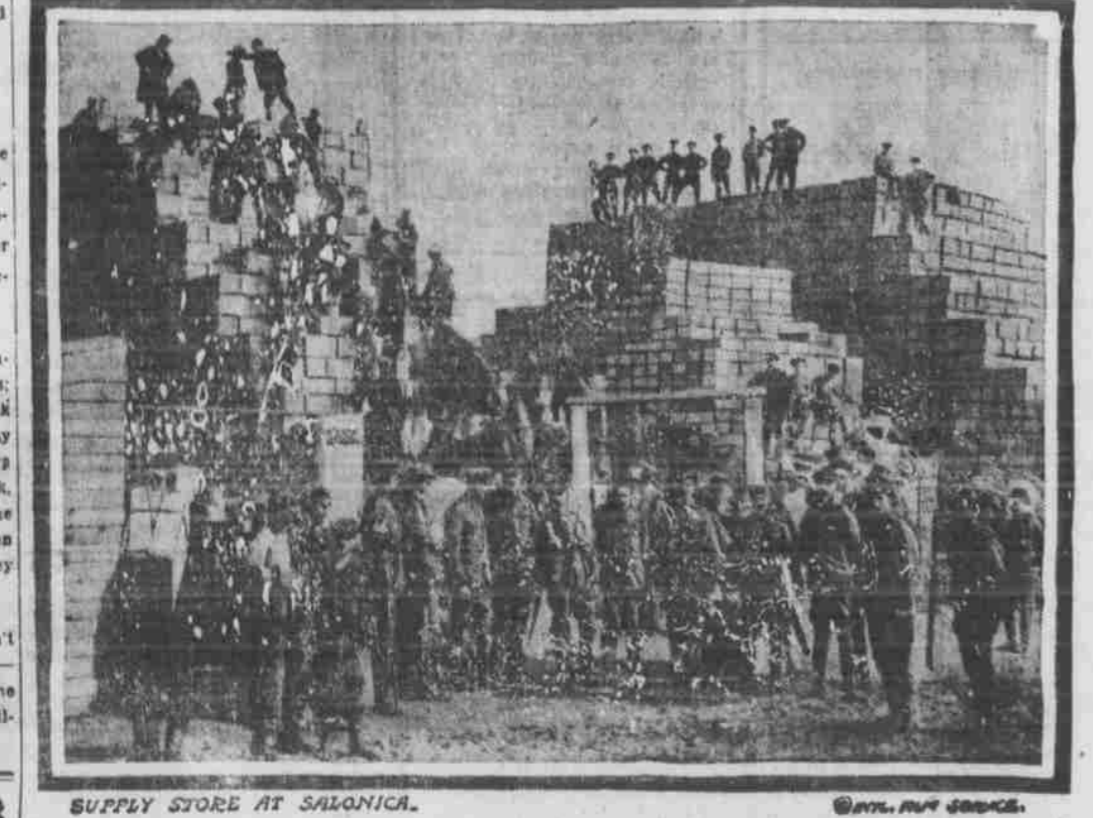
