Epiphany? No, it's Divorce.
NEW YORK, April 29.—Married January 13, 1915; first error by bride, January 22; divorce suit begun, February 2; divorce granted, April 14.

Swiss Line is Crossed.
GENEVA, via Paris, May 1.—(Delayed in transmission.)—Swiss territory has again been violated by a German aeroplane. The machine flew over the region of Porentruy at dawn and was bombarded by Swiss troops all along the frontier. The aircraft dropped bombs on the

French town of Delle, 11 miles south-east of Belfort, and then crossed the Swiss frontier a second time, finally disappearing in the direction of Alsace.
