Businessmen Will Discriminate in Giving Their Aid

"BLUE SKY" COMMITTEE TO INVESTIGATE WHEN CONTRIBUTIONS ASKED.

For the purpose of protecting the business men from solicitors for undeserving projects, a "blue sky" committee will be appointed by President Brock to pass upon all matters calling for contributions from the public.

President Brock suggested the new committee last evening at the monthly meeting and the idea met with general favor. In this way, it is believed, undeserving matters will be turned down and deserving matters will be placed in hands that will carry them through.

A. R. Blewett, president of the Blewett Harvester Co., called attention to the fact that the association had guaranteed the \$2400 balance on the \$25,000 to be subscribed by local people. He stated that all of the money is needed now and urged that the association take steps to raise the balance.

J. V. Tallman, chairman of the committee in charge, stated that he was ready to go out again at once. He declared the company had more than kept faith inasmuch as the Blewetts were employing 52 men at the plant, whereas a force of 25 was all that had been expected of them. He stated that the 27 machines to be turned out by June 1 are now being assembled and most of them sold. He also declared that he had pretty definite information that the company would pay eight per cent dividends the first year.

Seven new members were added last evening, as follows: Dr. George E. King, Dr. H. J. Kavanaugh, A. R. Blewett, E. C. Day, C. E. Nelson, Charles Serrell and James H. Sturgis. It was suggested that an active canvass be made for more new members.

Not Championing Railroads. Inasmuch as some complaint has been heard from the railroad men over the resolution passed by the Commercial association last month, the resolution was read again. Its wording was very plain and could not be construed as being for the railroads and against the employees. It simply suggested that each party to the controversy over an increase in wages should agree to arbitration before taking an extreme measure. Members of the association were all very emphatic that it was never their understanding that the association was acting in behalf of the railroads.

three times during his campaign with a promise to appoint him recorder if elected and that such promises had been made voluntarily. However, he stated, he knew the appointment was with the council and not with the mayor.

He stated that, inasmuch as a great many witnesses living in Pendleton would be subpoenaed, a change of venue would result in a great expense to the county and, under the circumstances, he said, he did not believe such an expense would be justified.

Judge Fee voiced his opinion that the court would be reversed by a higher court, and stated he would appeal from the ruling.

MARATHA HEDMAN IN "THE CUB" AT ALTA

World Film Corporation presents Maratha Hedman in a five part Wm. A. Brady photoplay, "The Cub," based on the stage offering of the same name. Thompson Buchanan, who wrote "Life," was the author.

Miss Hedman, who had a distinguished stage career in Sweden, England and the United States, is one of the numerous clever and beautiful actresses who owed her principal opportunities to the late Charles Frohman, who brought her to this country. This is her first appearance in motion pictures.

"MORAL FABRIC" IS AN ATTACK ON "FREE LOVE" Fate of Two People Who Scorn Conventions Shown in New Triangle Play.

In presenting "The Moral Fabric," the Triangle-Kay Bee feature starring Frank Mills, talented and experienced actor of the speaking stage, Producer Thomas H. Ince claims to offer a subject of absorbing interest and a most unusual plot. The theme of the story is the fallacy of the "free love" theory, and the play is a blow at the basic structure of the principle which the advocates of the "free love" propaganda profess to expound.

The drama is from the pen of C. Gardner Sullivan, of the Ince staff of photo playwrights, and presents a woman who is deceived by the wiles of a rich young Don Juan and her husband, a man of few words, but a deep thinker. About this trio Sullivan has conceived a plot that causes the two weaker characters to undergo a complete change, and which presents the fallacies of their theory as they would work out in actual practice.

The husband, of course, is the apex about which the action revolves. This part, played by Mills, is said to be handled by that artist in a masterly manner. Sullivan conceived the idea of the theme for his story after attending a lecture given by a "free thinkers" organization.
