# NEWS OF PENDLETON

**Masons to Hermitston.**

**Will Move House.**

**To Protest Service Station.**  
One of the subjects for consideration before the council tonight will be the request of Power & Son for permit to install a gasoline service pump on Main street. It is reported today a protest will be made by some ladies on the ground that such stations should be confined to the side streets.

The funeral will be held tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock from Brown's undertaking parlors. Burial will be at Olney cemetery.

In the delegation were Henry La Zinka and Frank Byrd of Ukiah, Sam Nelson, James Nelson and John Brosman of Butter Creek and Dillard French of

The citation was issued upon the petition of 25 residents of the Fairview locality who alleged he was dangerous and that, to protect the school teacher and children from him, they found it necessary to hire a guard.
