INSTALLATION OF MASONIC ORDER IS BRILLIANT AFFAIR

CHAPTER OF ROYAL ARCH MASONS ORGANIZED WEDNESDAY AT HERMISTON.

HERMISTON, Ore., May 5.—A chapter of Royal Arch Masons was organized here Wednesday evening. The establishing of this order of Masonry is quite an epoch in the history of Hermiston. The organizing officer was Most Excellent Grand High Priest, Clyde Evans, of Portland, and the affair was quite brilliant from a Masonic and social standpoint.

The grand chapter was opened by Grand High Priest Evans. He was assisted by High Priest Roosevelt of Pendleton Chapter No. 13, and High Priest Gilliam, of Heppner Chapter, No. 28, also by other companions from different chapters in this grand jurisdiction.

A dispensation for organizing the chapter gives the name of "Damascus," and the officers are S. R. Oldaker, high priest; A. F. Garner, king; W. A. Ford, scribe; A. W. Fran, captain of the host; M. J. Barthel, principal sojourner; E. I. Davis, royal arch captain; W. H. Skinner, master of the third wall; George E. Butterwood, master of the second wall; W. A. Belcamper, master of the first wall; O. P. Brigham, treasurer; John McNurilla, secretary; Wm. Switzer, guard.

After the organization was completed, a subordinate chapter was opened, the dispensation engrossed upon the records, and several petitions for membership were presented. A special dispensation was granted, the petitions were accepted and advanced to the honorary degree of mark master.

The Eastern Star ladies prepared and served a banquet which was greatly enjoyed by those present, and brought forth many remarks of commendation for the ladies of Queen Esther Chapter. Several short addresses were given by the grand high priest and other companions.

Among those present from a distance were members of chapters from the states of Ohio, Michigan, Indiana, Illinois, Iowa, Idaho and Washington, besides members from several chapters in this grand jurisdiction.

At a meeting of the city council Wednesday evening, A. L. Larson and E. R. Reeves were elected councilmen to succeed Don Campbell and H. D. Pounds who recently resigned. No other business came before the meeting, except the usual routine of paying bills, etc.

French Positions Along the Meuse Greatly Improved

Lines have been extended following gains of a few days ago.

PARIS, May 4.—The French last night extended their lines consolidating yesterday's gains at Deadman's Hill, a communicable claimed. Their positions have been improved in the whole region of the Meuse. Yesterday's German losses at Deadman's Hill were reported heavy. East of the Meuse, bombardments raged around Vaux. East of St. Mihiel the French repulsed a strong reconnaissance.

French artillery is backing up the Belgians and British in northern France. They have destroyed German works at Grandtune, exploding a seacoast munitions depot.

MANY MEN GAIN BY INCREASE IN WAGES THROUGHOUT NATION

BUREAU OF LABOR STATISTICS GIVE FIGURES SHOWING SITUATION.

WASHINGTON, May 5.—The bureau of labor statistics compiled figures today showing the average wage increase throughout the country in various industries. The following increases are effective:

- Paint manufacturers, 19 per cent.
 - Automobile, 17 per cent.
 - Flour mills, shipbuilders, electrical, iron, steel workers, 15 per cent.
 - Rubber, machinery, foundry, locomotives, 14 per cent.
 - Dry goods, hardware, paper, 13 per cent.
 - Groceries, woollens, pottery, brick, 12 per cent.
 - Chemicals, clothing, soap, fertilizers, 11 per cent.
 - Agricultural implements, furniture, shoes, leather, 9 per cent.
 - Confectionery, cotton, 8 per cent.
 - Department stores, 7 per cent.
 - Tobacco, 6 per cent.
 - Coal miners, 5 per cent.
- Most of the increases have gone to skilled labor. The figures do not include bonuses paid by munitions plants and some mines.
- Secretary Morrison of the Federation of Labor, predicted big annual increases beginning in May and affecting more than 700,000 workers which will stimulate two million more to make

demands. He also expected demonstrations by a larger number of unorganized workers.

Orpet Gets Venue Change.

WAUKEGAN, Ill., March 22.—To Will H. Orpet, accused of killing Marion Frances Lambert, was granted a change of venue from Judge C. C. Edwards of Waukegan, to another judge of the same court.

The petition asking for a change of venue alleged that Judge Edwards was prejudiced.

Decision on the motion to quash the indictment and setting a date for trial will rest with the judge to whom the case is next presented.
