"HOODOO ANN" WAS READY FOR A BURGLAR

And It Wasn't Her Fault if Somebody Else Got In the Way When She Fled.

With all the talk of national preparedness, how many women are there in the United States who know how to handle a gun? This pertinent question is presented in "Hoodoo Ann," a new Triangle-Fine Arts release. It is brought up, in the picture, by a preparedness campaign resulting from a burglar scare in the little town of Meadowdale.

Ann determines to learn how to use a gun, so she will know what to do if a burglar enters the household of which she is a member. Like many another woman, she is afraid of the weapon when first it comes into her hands, and is more particular about getting the awful noise over than about where she aims. Later, finding that the man's wife is accused of his murder, she comes forth and confesses guilt. But her confession is repudiated when the supposedly dead man interrupts trial proceedings by walking into court and declaring himself very much alive.

O'Gorman Will Retire.
 WASHINGTON, May 6.—In announcing his determination to retire from the senate next March, Senator O'Gorman, of New York, would add nothing to a formal statement he had prepared.

"I have decided," the senator's statement read, "not to accept the nomination for re-election to the senate. My personal affairs now require my undivided attention."

The senator's colleagues generally expressed surprise over his decision.

U. S. TROOPS DIGGING IN MEXICO



INFANTRY TRENCH AT COLONIA DUBLAN, MEXICO.

Ostensibly to keep in practice and to prevent the rains from flooding their tents during the rainy season which is approaching, the American troops at Colonia Dublin, are "digging in." This is the military term for digging trenches. With the river at their backs, they have formed entrenchments on three sides of the Mormon colony at Colonia Dublin, and mountain guns set up in the entrenchments, command all other approaches. This photograph shows a section of the trenches at Colonia Dublin. Note how the trench is cut back around a square just behind the soldier standing in the foreground. This is to prevent the destruction of the men in the trenches from entangling fire should a section be captured.

Losses at Sea Made Up.
 LONDON, May 6.—Earl Cruson, lord privy seal, announced in the house of lords that a total of 450 enemy ships had been detained, seized or captured by the allies in all parts of the world since the beginning of the war.

He added that the British merchant ships lost through war operations were exactly balanced in number and tonnage by the new ships added to the register since the war began.

Count de Castellane has appealed several times to the vatican for a ruling that his marriage was invalid.
