#### REPLIES TO SLANDER SUIT.

W. H. Lytle, State Veterinarian, Defendant in Action.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 10.—W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian, answers the \$50,000 slander suit filed against him by George H. Mokol by reasserting that the statements he made concerning Mokol are true. Lytle's answer was filed Monday.

Lytle admits writing the alleged libelous letter to O. M. Plummer, secretary of the Portland Union Stock yards, in reply to a query from Mr. Plummer. In this letter Lytle stated that he personally knew that Mokol had sold cattle affected with tuberculosis, and has been closely in league with James Dorsey of Gilberts, Ill., who was recently indicted by the federal grand jury for interstate movement of diseased animals.

In explanation of the letter, Lytle says he wrote it at the time Mokol's appointment as postmaster for the North Portland postoffice was before the United States senate for confirmation. He alleges that in 1912, 1913 and 1914 Mokol received cattle shipped from Illinois by Dorsey and both knew they were affected with tuberculosis. He asserts that Mokol sold the cattle to stockmen in this state for breeding purposes.

## Woolen Mills of State to Retain the 10-Hour Day

EXEMPTION IS MADE BY THE OREGON WELFARE COMMISSION AT MEETING.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 10.—Woolen mills operating in Oregon will be exempted from the provisions of the nine-hour rule which the revision conference of the Industrial Welfare Commission proposes to apply generally to manufacturing industries of the state.

A decision to this effect was reached at a meeting of the conference yesterday following appeals from both the employers and employees in the woolen industry, and after hearing a request from a committee representing the Portland chamber of commerce that no "burdensome restrictions" be imposed upon manufacturers.

Nine-Hour Day Proposed. The conference previously had adopted a recommendation for a nine-hour day for women workers in all occupations. The present regulations allow women to work not to exceed ten hours a day, with a maximum of 54 hours a week. Under the present ruling women in the woolen mills
