Finds \$6000 Legacy. WARREN, Pa., May 11.—Ten months ago Martin Nelson was so hard up that he didn't care how he got money. Shortly afterward he was convicted of obtaining it under false pretenses and was sent to jail for six months. The publicity caused by his arrest led to his discovery by friends who had good news for him.

Today Nelson was off for his old home in Denmark to claim a legacy of \$6000. Had he never been sent to jail probably he never would have heard of the legacy. So, at least, the Danish consul declared. He said that he had been seeking Nelson for five years. The newspaper clipping telling of Nelson's arrest and imprisonment in the Warren county jail was the first trace he got of him.
