NOTICE OF REQUEST FOR BIDS FOR STREET SPRINKLING.
 Notice is hereby given that sealed bids will be received at the office of the City Recorder in Pendleton, Oregon, up to 3 o'clock P. M. on May 16, 1916, for sprinkling the unpaved streets of the City of Pendleton for the season of 1916.
 For the purpose of sprinkling, the City will be divided into districts as follows:
 District No. 1—All that part of the City lying north of the Umatilla River.
 District No. 2—All that part of the City lying south of the Umatilla River and east of Main Street.
 District No. 3—All that part of the City lying south of the Umatilla River and west of Main Street.
 No street that has been paved to be included in the contract. Each bid must specify the price per man and team per month, straight time, man and team to be under the direction of the Street Commissioner when not engaged in street sprinkling; the City to furnish sprinkling wagons and water. Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check in the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00), made payable to the order of the Mayor of the City of Pendleton, as an evidence of good faith, the same to be forfeited to the City if the bidder is successful and refuses to sign the contract with the City in accordance with the terms of this notice, and to be returned to the bidder if unsuccessful. The Common Council reserves the right to reject any and all bids, in its discretion.

Wheat Report Finds No Favor
Crop Figures are Disregarded by the Leading Traders
 SHARP ADVANCE IN CHICAGO COMES; NO RELIANCE PLACED ON REPORT.
 PORTLAND, Ore., May 11.—Indicating that the American grain trade places little reliance upon the government report was the sharp advance made early in the session of the Chicago market for wheat during the day. Much criticism is shown in the local trade regarding the government's report of the Pacific northwest crop, which is said to be estimated far below the actual showing. Private advices received from the various districts not only fail to bear out the government's report of the smallest crop known in years in Oregon, but the replies show that better than an average condition is shown at the moment.
 Middle west millers are bidding for small lots of Pacific northwest wheat but sales are limited because prices are not satisfactory.
 Oats and barley markets are quoted very firm at country points with demand best for oats.
 Broomhall cabled from Liverpool that wheat was steady with shippers offers fewer, but arrivals liberal. Spots unchanged, cargoes steady, with Manitoba and winters 3d dealer. Export offers firmly held with an absence of Indian offers. Australian is sparingly offered. Continued unfavorable reports from United States and fears of reduced acreage in Canada is exerting an influence on sentiment, but arrivals keep liberal.
 Buenos Aires wheat closed easy with free arrivals. Tonnage scarce and in urgent demand and shipments of all grain are expected to be moderate this week.

PRICE OF SALMON IS EXPECTED TO OPEN AT THE 1915 QUOTATION
 PORTLAND, Ore., May 11.—While formal announcement of the official opening price for Columbia river spring pack salmon will not be made for several days, it is now practically assured that the price will open the same as in 1915, despite the higher cost of raw materials for the pack, as well as an advance for the fish itself.
 Leaders of the canned salmon industry say that while they have not made any shipments of new pack fish to date because of the very small catches, they will bill out initial shipments at last year's values. This means that if the price is named higher than a year ago, the canners billing at last year's quotations will lose the amount of the advance, while on the other hand, they will be compelled to rebate the purchases any amount that the market may drop.
 This, therefore, leaves the situation substantially the same as a year ago so far as the price is concerned. Orders for new pack Chinook are coming forward rather freely on the basis of prices to be named at the opening.
 "The catch of salmon is very small, both in the Columbia and Willamette rivers," says Robert S. Farrall of Everding & Farrell, owners of the Pillar Rock Packing company. "The present ideas of the trade are for opening prices the same as a year ago."
