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RECONSTRUCTION OF SERBIA IS UNDER WAY

(By United Press.)
 ATHENS, May 15.—Germany has begun reconstructing Serbia. Austria-Hungary has charge of the work, but at the top Germans are directing it. If the people will agree to become Germans—insofar as it is possible to make them over—a point has now been reached where the conquerors are evidently disposed to treat them humanely.

Men are being invited to return to their homes on condition that they cultivate the land in the Austro-German interests. Russian prisoners are even being loaned to them to help with farm work.

Mills are being refitted with modern machinery, expert engineers have assumed management of the mines and every effort is being made to find workers in both from the native population.

A similar policy is being adopted in Montenegro. At the same time these industrial and agricultural improvements are in progress, both countries are being turned into huge fortifications.

Schools are also being opened. In Belgrade two are running, with a total attendance of about 3000. Instruction, however, is solely in German. Serbian children are compelled to learn it, whether they wish to or not.
