### Natorium Committee Makes Financial Report

All obligations in connection with the construction of the Natatorium having been met the Natatorium committee of the Commercial Association has submitted a final report as to the subscription receipts and the disbursements. The summarized report is as follows:  
Complete report, in detail, of the Natatorium Committee of the Pendleton Commercial Association, Pendleton, Ore., April 16, 1916.  
To the Commercial Association, The County of Umatilla, The Donors of the Fund, The General Public.  
Sufficient subscriptions have been paid to clean up the remaining outstanding obligations against the Natatorium Committee or the Pendleton Commercial Association, we now submit herewith for your information, consideration and approval a recapitulation of the different items entering into the cost of the pool, buildings, etc. A detailed list of the subscriptions and disbursements is also appended hereto. A little less than one hundred dollars of the subscriptions remain unpaid, but no further effort will be made to collect these. However, any future payments will be turned over to the committee of the council, which now has the management of the natatorium:
