OBJECTS TO BONDING.

Pendleton, Ore., May 18.
Editor East Oregonian:

Since my name has been used many times lately by the bond boosters, I would like a little space to correct the statements made by them.

First, I am assessed at about \$50,000, and \$20,000 life insurance to protect my family against debts.

I taught school 10 years and have been farming 15 years.

Second, I am not stingy. I have spent over \$1000 the last year for public enterprises and social helpfulness.

Third, I am not opposing these roads because they do not pass my place, because in fact, they do pass over and through 90 per cent of my land.

I oppose these roads because they will not reduce freights or accommodate the products of the county going to market.

I oppose bonds because of the \$1,400,000, total payments of principal and interest at 4 1/2 per cent, \$418,950 goes to bond holders and if the bonds sell for 6 per cent the same as Multnomah county interstate bridge bonds sold for then we will pay \$750,000 or more than 3-4 the principal of \$380,000.

Royalties to patented paving, 25 per cent at least; engineering and profits to contractors, 25 per cent at least, or summing up all at 4 1/2 per cent bonds:

Bond holders \$418,950
Royalties, engineering and contractors' profits 490,000
Roads 490,000
