SAN FRANCISCO, May 23.—"Dr." John Grant Lyman, held in New York on a charge of using the mails to defraud, telegraphed \$1500 to the United States circuit court of appeals to defray the cost of his appeal from a conviction on a similar charge in Los Angeles in 1913. It was his last day of grace.
