### WOULD-BE SUICIDE TALKS.

CHICAGO, May 31.—The motive that led Frank St. John, a salesman, to shoot himself last night became tangled in a series of contradictory statements and denials made by the young man as he lay in a serious condition in the Alexian Brothers' hospital. He first told the police of the Town Hall station, to which he was taken in a taxicab, that he had been attacked by robbers. Later he told them he had shot himself as the result of a quarrel with Miss Marion Wilder, at whose home he is living and with whom he had passed the evening. Miss Wilder denied they had quarreled and insisted she was nothing more to him than a "sister." Later St. John retracted his second explanation.

"There is nothing between Miss Wilson and me," he said. "I am engaged to be married to Miss Ruth Anderson, daughter of C. J. Anderson." Asked why he had tried to take his life, St. John became silent. "I don't want to say any more," he said. Miss Anderson declared she and her fiancée had not quarreled. "He received a special delivery letter from his mother yesterday," she said, "and perhaps there was something in that that made him despondent."

### GREW SAID TO BEAR KAISER'S TERMS OF PEACE TO WILSON.

WASHINGTON, May 30.—Keeping under cover the purport of the message he is said to bring from Ambassador Gerard after a conference at the battle front with the Kaiser, Joseph C. Grew, first secretary at the American embassy in Berlin, has arrived at Washington.

Since his return to America, Mr. Grew has evaded all questions as to the terms of peace the message is supposed to set forth. It is said that after the Kaiser had answered President Wilson's last note, he says Ambassador Gerard the outline of the basis of possible peace agreeable to the German people. The president, it was said, was to be asked by the German Kaiser to make the first move in bringing the war to a close.

## CURTAIN IS ABOUT TO RISE ON ANNUAL PORTLAND FESTIVAL

ONLY FEW MORE DAYS REMAIN BEFORE BIG ROSE SHOW WILL BE ON.

All is in readiness for the great celebration; Rose Fountain is nearly completed; Many Communities Will Compete for Prizes in Floral Feature.

PORTLAND, May 31.—(Special.)—The curtain is about ready to rise on the Tenth Annual Rose Festival. In a few days anticipation will be turned to realization.

All is ready for the great celebration. The streets for the festival center in the park blocks have been closed to traffic and more than forty beds of bloom are fast taking shape. The rose fountain is nearly complete and sixteen communities of Portland will compete for the prizes in the floral feature of the fiesta.

While the festival has its official opening the morning of June 7, the queen is to be crowned the evening before in order that she may ride crowned in the children's parade opening morning at 9:45 a. m. The railroads have offered low fares for the round trip. Great crowds are expected in Portland and all hotels are ready for the guests. Indications are that Portland will entertain many visitors from Washington, Idaho, Montana and British Columbia, since agents of railroads all over the northwest report many inquiries regarding the features of the 1916 rose festival.

**Southern Girl War Bride.**  
MEMPHIS, May 31.—A tangled story of love and war, romance and chivalry, patriotism and self-sacrifice, is woven about the marriage of William Andrew Hood and Miss Dorothy Carr, according to reports from Clarkdale, Miss., where their wedding was solemnized.

It is said that when the young couple reaches the bridegroom's home at Kirkcubright, Scotland, he will depart at once for the front to join his regiment in France in fighting the

Germans. The bride will remain behind, it is said, engaged in caritative work for the relief of the Scotch soldiers who are in the trenches.

Mrs. Hood, it is reported, insisted before her marriage that she be allowed to accompany her husband to the front, and there enlist as a Red Cross nurse, in order to be near him. Hood, however, demurred so strongly that she gave up the idea and agreed to remain at his mother's home in Scotland to sew, knit and do other deeds of charity and mercy. The call

to the colors came to Hood shortly after his engagement to Miss Carr was announced. He proposed to defer their marriage until after the war was over but she insisted she was willing to undergo its hardships and privations with him and even to be separated from him while he was fighting.

Though a native Scotchman, Hood has been in the south several years, engaged in tie cotton business. He previously resided in Memphis, but more recently has made his headquarters at Dallas, Texas.
