AUSTRIANS ADMIT THE RUSSIAN SUCCESSES

VIENNA, June 8.—Further successes for the Russians in their great offensive in which they have taken more than 40,000 prisoners along the Pruth frontier to the Roumanian border were admitted in the official Austrian report. Few details were given, but admission was made that the Austrians had retired before superior forces of the Russians at Volhynia. No details of Austrian casualties were made public.
