Russians capture Lusk. PETROGRAD, June 12.—The capture of Lusk in Volhynia, and also of a series of powerfully organized Austrian positions is announced in an official communication given out here.

In addition to the Americans previously captured in the offensive movement recently inaugurated, the statement says there were captured 58 officers and 11,000 men. A large amount of war material also was taken.

WHEAT CONDITIONS LOOK GOOD IN THE MILTON DISTRICTS

IMPROVEMENT IS SEEN BUT GRAIN NOT YET UP TO NORMAL APPEARANCE.

Yellow Tinge Has Not Yet Entirely Disappeared; Some Growers Are Pessimistic Over the Outlook; Free Water Will Distribute \$700 in Cash Prizes at Cherry Day, June 21.

(East Oregonian Special.) MILTON, FREEWATER, Ore. June 12.—Wheat prospects are looking better in this section of the country than at any time so far this year, but are far from being of normal appearance, and the grain stands not over 20 to 25 inches high on an average, and much of it is heading out although less than two feet high.

Of course it is hard to predict just what the yield will be until it is threshed, but some of the largest growers are frankly pessimistic over the outlook.

Freewater will distribute \$700 in cash prizes at her Cherry Day June 21, to winners of display and athletic events. The cherry displays will certainly be complete and beautiful if growers show their best products that time.

Other events for which prizes are offered are water fight between hose teams, fat man's race, ladies' nail driving contest, hot pie eating contest, auto race for Purds only, slow speed on high gear, three legged race, relay wheelbarrow race, traveling man's race catching the greased pig, and a baseball game between Freewater and Umapine. ## A SHORT CUT IN FIGURING PARCELS POST CHARGES

The following rules are great time savers in finding parcel post charges. In this table the number of pounds the package weighs is used as a basis in each case.

To find the postage on a package to—

1st of 2nd zone simply add 4 cents to the number of pounds

3rd zone, multiply number of pounds by 2 and add 4 cents

4th zone, multiply by 4 and add three cents

5th zone, multiply by 6 and add 2 cents

6th zone, multiply by eight and add 1 cent

7th zone, multiply by 10 and add 1 cent

8th zone, multiply by 12
