Remnant of Cervantes Followers are Put to Flight After Attempt to Ambush the Americans.

THREE MEXICANS ARE KILLED

None of the Americans Injured; Cavalrymen Surprise Bandits by Flank Attack; Villistas Keep Up Heavy Fire But Give Away Before Charge; Escape Into Hills.

WASHINGTON, June 13.—Additional reports from Mexico today, the administration officials admitted, caused further concern. Laredo reports were especially disquieting. Most of the reinforcements were ordered yesterday to be sent to this section. Officials were inclined to believe that the rapid spread of feeling among the natives against the presence of the American expedition beyond the border was due to a systematic propaganda by enemies of the de facto government. Consuls reported mass meetings held in many towns, probably under Diaz direction. The war department declared that no further militia would be called unless the situation develops alarming conditions.

EL PASO, June 13.—Three Carranzistas were reported killed in a clash with negro troops of the tenth cavalry, near Dublin. The Carranzistas took 15 American soldiers prisoners but released them afterwards, it was reported.

MEXICO CITY, June 13.—Carranza today took steps toward the establishment of a civil government throughout Mexico. He issued a decree calling municipal elections for the first Sunday in September. The

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Flag Day Will be Observed Here in Appropriate Way

EMBLEM OF FREEDOM WILL BE DISPLAYED ON ALL BUILDINGS TOMORROW.

Tomorrow is Flag Day in the United States, the anniversary of the birth of the national emblem, and there will be a general observance of the day in Oregon Governor Withycombe has issued a proclamation calling upon the people of the state to display the flag from schools, homes and public buildings, to devote the day to exercises conducive to loyalty to the flag and to unite in pledging anew loyalty to the flag and to the principles it represents.

The principal observance here in Pendleton will be conducted by Pendleton lodge No. 238, B. P. O. E. Tomorrow evening the lodge will hold its annual Flag Day exercises and has invited the Grand Army and Spanish War veterans to attend. The program will open with the singing of "America." Introductory exercises will be conducted by the exalted ruler and officers, D. B. Bailey will read a history of the flag, Mrs. Carl Power will sing a selected solo, Rev. H. H. Hubbell, representing the Spanish War veterans, will make a short address, an altar service, "The Floral Liberty Bell" will be conducted by the exalted ruler and officers, the audience will sing "Auld Lang Syne," J. A. Gibson will give the Elks' Tribute to the flag and the exercises will close with the singing of the Star Spangled Banner.

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A. C. Hampton Elected to Fill Principalship at La Grande

Succeeds Olson Who Resigns as Head of High School in Union County City; Place Comes to Local Man Without Solicitation

Prof. A. C. Hampton of this city, for nine years principal of the Pendleton high school and city superintendent during the past year, was last night elected to the principalship of the La Grande high school to succeed Principal Olson, resigned.

This was the message imparted to Prof. Hampton over the telephone this morning by Supt. Girdler of that city. He had not been an applicant for the position and it came to him without the seeking. Several days ago he was called up by the La Grande board and asked to name the salary at which he would accept the position. His election last night carried with it the salary named, though it is considerably more than the La Grande board has ever paid before.

Prof. Hampton announced this morning that he would probably accept the position. He will leave about June 20 for Eugene, having been invited by the University of Oregon educational department to address the educational conference there on June 22 on the subject "Standard Tests of High School Efficiency." Prof. Hampton states that he will probably remain at the university for six weeks to take summer work.

In going to La Grande, Prof. Hampton will leave a great many friends in Pendleton who will regret his departure genuinely. As principal of the high school for nine years he was largely instrumental in raising that institution to its present high standard. While he has always taken a prominent part in all educational activities in the city, his greatest success here has been as a "boy man." The fact that in his ten years in the schools here there has never been a student insurrection and that he has never expelled a boy or girl from the schools is the highest testimonial to his ability in supervising young people. His record here has won for him recognition all over the state.

Prof. Hampton also drew considerable notice while here, when as coach of the high school debating team for five years, he won for the school two state championships and sent four teams into the finals.

He will go over to La Grande in the morning to confer with the board and superintendent there.

Resentment Shown Over Attempt to Misuse Round-Up

POSTERS ADVERTISING ASHLAND SHOW ARE MISLEADING IN EVERY WAY.

There is considerable resentment in Pendleton over the posters being sent out by the men back of a wild west show to be staged at Ashland on July 4-5-6. The poster type is printed "See the Pendleton Round-Up at Ashland July 4-5-6," with a slogan, imitative of the local slogan, reading "Let 'em Buck."

The fact that there is absolutely no connection between the Pendleton Round-Up and the little show which is to be staged at Ashland makes the advertisements manifestly fraudulent. The misrepresentation, it is pointed out, will do the local show an injustice inasmuch as it is but a small affair and can in no way vie with the big September attraction in this city. Other places, putting on wild west shows, have borrowed the name "Round-Up" and have adopted the Round-Up slogan but none have ever been so brazen as deliberately to use the name Pendleton.

Clarence Adams, formerly of this county, is staging the Ashland show and is to be assisted by Carl Power of this city. Neither have ever had any official connection with the Round-Up.

Newspaper Plant Wrecked. DEADWOOD, S. D., June 12.—The newspaper plant of E. T. Senn was wrecked by unknown persons. Senn has been waging a war on vice here for several years.

WORLD TO KNOW THAT U. S. WILL BACK UP WORDS

President Wilson Declares That America Will Uphold the Monroe Doctrine Under all Conditions.

TELLS MILITARY GRADUATES

In Speech at West Point Today Wilson Says That Every Nation Will Be Shown That America Means What She Says When She Speaks; Is Ready to Enforce Justice.

WEST POINT, June 13.—"The world is going to know that when America speaks she means what she says," President Wilson told the graduating class of the military academy today. He promised in behalf of America to uphold the Monroe Doctrine. He promised that when the time comes America will be ready to join the other nations to "see that the kind of justice prevails everywhere that we believe in."

Being military does not mean militaristic, the president said. Mentioning a small number who love their native country more than the country of their adoption he said, "nobody who does not put America first can consent with us."

"The United States wants nothing that it must get by war," he continued, "these are days when we are making preparations. The thing most commonly discussed is preparedness. Undoubtedly it is a present imperative duty that America be prepared. But we must know what we are preparing for. Preparedness might be a hazard, one thing in which our forefathers took pride was that the civil power was superior to the military power."

German Americans Feel Jubilant Over Hughes Nomination

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., June 13.—

The nomination of Hughes and Fairbanks to head the national republican ticket is claimed by prominent German-Americans of Philadelphia to be a decisive victory for the alliance perfected in Chicago two weeks ago in which nearly 70 strong German societies were represented and which have working organizations in 39 states.

Speaking for the Germans of Philadelphia and eastern Pennsylvania, Gustav Mayer, publisher of the German Gazette, this morning made the significant declaration that 85 per cent of the German-Americans of the United States, who number nearly 2,000,000 voters, will support the republican ticket in face of the fact that many have in past years voted the democratic ticket, particularly in the western and middle western states.

Gallons of Booze Finds Its Way to the City Cutters

50 PROOF WHISKEY - POURED AWAY IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE LAW.

Fifty-two gallons of 50-proof whiskey gurgled its way out of a barrel this morning, splattered into the gutter in front of the office of Justice of the Peace Parkes and gurgled its odorous way along the curbing for half a block until it poured, in a gentle, amber cascade, through the grating of the storm sewer. Thus did the prohibition law bring to an end the liquor over which there was a strong fight made since its seizure by Sheriff Taylor in the Harris lodging house.

The liquor was claimed by Walter Mountain, son-in-law of Mrs. Harris. Under the facts as recited to him, Justice of the Peace Parkes held that the barrel of liquor could not properly be classified as a nuisance. However, the state appealed and Judge Phelps upheld the state's contention, and ordered the liquor destroyed.

At 10 o'clock, Sheriff Taylor and his deputies, J. A. Makely and J. H. Estes, rolled the barrel down the steps and to the curbing. George Simpson bored a hole into the drum and the liquor poured forth. Many stood and watched the scene, photos were taken and not a few sniffed the fumes with long inhalations. Finally someone applied a match to the liquor as it flowed along and the alcohol taking fire, it was soon blazing all the way long and on down into the sewer.

"UNDILUTED AMERICANISM" TO BE SLOGAN OF HUGHES

REPUBLICAN CANDIDATE COINS PHRASE IN TALK WITH NEWSPAPERMEN.

NEW YORK, June 13.—"Undiluted Americanism" will be Hughes' slogan in his campaign for the presidency. He coined the phrase today while talking to newspapermen.

TO REACH BINGHAM BY PHONE

LONG DISTANCE CONNECTION WILL BE INSTALLED WITH POPULAR RESORT.

Bingham Springs patrons will welcome the news that the mountain resort is to be connected with the long distance telephone through the construction of a line from Weston to Bingham by the forestry service.

The forest service is constructing a line from Weston to the ranger station above Bingham and according to Manager Mable of the local phone office the work will be completed in a month. Application has been made for a branch line to the Bingham hotel and there are assurances that this request will be granted.

At the present time the only way of communicating by wire with Bingham is by telegraphing to Gibbon and having the message relayed by phone to the springs. The through long distance service will be a great convenience.

COLBY IS ASKED TO SWING OVER FOR DEMOCRATS

Progressive Who Repudiated Roosevelt Receives an Invitation to Join Party From McCombs.

DELEGATES IN AT ST. LOUIS

Every Train Brings in Men Who Will Attend Convention Starting Tomorrow; Marshall Will be Renominated Declare Leaders; Some of Delegates Injured in Train Wreck.

ST. LOUIS, June 13.—McCombs today wired Bainbridge Colby of New York an invitation to join the democratic party. This action was based on Colby's repudiation of Roosevelt, who he nominated at Chicago.

Gompers arrived today prepared to demand that the resolutions committee incorporate labor planks in the democratic platform.

The democratic hosts poured into St. Louis today. Before night more than 1000 delegates are expected. The gentle work of puncturing vice-presidential booms proceeded neatly today. Marshall will be renominated, leaders averred. Although Secretary Baker, Roger Sullivan and Governor Major are candidates, they may never reach the floor of the convention.

Several Kentucky democrats enroute to the convention were injured this morning when their train was wrecked near Owensboro. Mayor Buchmeyer of Louisville was badly bruised. Governor Stanley and former governor McCreary were not injured.

Against Justices in Politics. WASHINGTON, June 13.—Senator Thomas introduced a resolution for a constitutional amendment prohibiting members of the supreme court from being candidates for public office.

4 Men Killed in Fire. BALTIMORE, June 13.—Four men were killed and fifty injured when a grain elevator was destroyed, a pier damaged and two British steamers almost destroyed by a fire starting in a grain elevator.

RUSSIAN DRIVE IS RAPIDLY GOING ON ALONG EAST FRONT

PETROGRAD, June 13.—A thousand and more Austrians have been captured and their computers are retreating rapidly along the entire front. It was officially announced tonight.

LONDON, June 13.—So rapid was the advance of the Russians near Lutsk that the Austrians in several instances did not have time to fire the guns they had loaded, said a Petrograd dispatch today. The Russians turned the guns right about and used them.

Diplomatic circles reported that the prospect of Roumania joining the allies is growing daily with the advance of the Russians into Bukovina.

It is estimated that more than a third of the Austrian armies on the eastern front have been killed, wounded or captured since the offensive started. Approximately 120,000 have been captured. The new Russian line makes a deep U into the Kovel region. Every mile that the Austrians are driven back makes the German positions toward Riga less tenable.

BERLIN (Wireless to Sayville) June 13.—An Austrian official statement reports minor victories at several points in the fighting to stop the powerful Russian drive. It declares that the Russian losses have been tremendous because of the reckless use of mass formations.

"The Austro-Hungarian artillery broke down Russian attacks on the heights east of Wladimir. East of Kovel, Austrian scout detachments captured a Russian advance post. Northwest of Tarnopol violent fighting continued. Positions near Vozeslovsk changed hands several times. West of Kovel yesterday the Austrians repulsed the Russian in their attempt to cross the Herzon."

PARIS, June 13.—By night attack the Germans have penetrated the advanced French trenches east of Hénin 224 said a communiqué. At all other points the attacks were repulsed. Infantry charges have been made along the entire sector west of Thiaumont.
