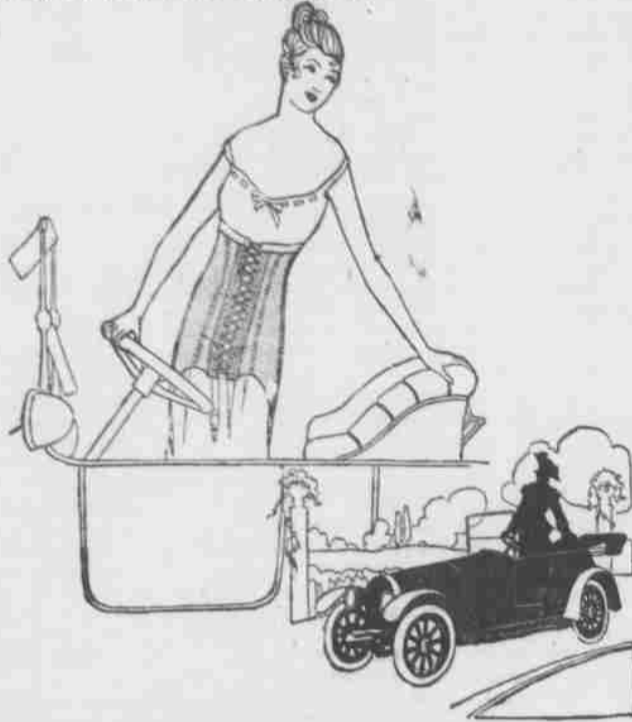

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VIRGINIA MUST GIVE W. VIRGINIA TIME

WASHINGTON, June 12.—The United States supreme court denied the petition of the state of Virginia to deny execution for a \$12,960,000 judgment against the state of West Virginia. The court held that Virginia must wait to enforce its collection until after the legislature of West Virginia convenes and has sufficient time to act on the claim. The debt dates back to the separation at the time of the civil war.
