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Nail in Head 50 Years.
LAWSON, Pa., June 12.—A four-penny nail, after being 50 years in the head of Fred Siebert, Jr., came out through the roof of his mouth. Mr. Siebert has suffered since he was 17 years of age with constant headaches and, despite medical skill, nothing could be done for him. His headache ceased when the bit of iron emerged through the roof of his mouth. When 17 years old a piece of lumber fell on Siebert's head and caused an ugly wound. Later the wound healed and the head pains became frequent.

Attorney is Bankrupt.
NEW YORK, June 12.—Sued by many creditors, Herbert L. Roth, a lawyer with a large theatrical practice, filed a petition in bankruptcy recently. He gave liabilities of \$17,236, assets \$5295.
Robert W. Golet is named as a creditor to the extent of \$1248. Others are William Huff, \$120,000, and ex-Sheriff Julius Harburger, \$250. Among the assets are these claims for legal services: Michael B. Leavitt and estate of Abe Leavitt, \$1000; Edward Davis, of the Greenroom Club, \$2500; and Arthur G. Delamater, \$225.

AUSTRIA DOES NOT SEEK TO ANNEX ANY BIG SERBIAN AREA

COUNT APPONYI, OPPOSITION LEADER IN HUNGARIAN PARLIAMENT TALKS.

In interview He Declares That He Does Not Look for Breaking Up of the Serbian Kingdom; Only Strategic Positions Will Remain in the Hands of the Conquerors.

(By Carl W. Ackerman, United Press Staff Correspondent.)

BUDAPEST, June 12.—"I do not look for the annexation of any large part of Serbia by Austria-Hungary," declared Count Albert Apponyi, opposition leader in the Hungarian parliament, in an exclusive interview granted the United Press today.

"Only strategic positions must remain in our hands."

Count Apponyi is often called the "greatest statesman of Hungary." His statement is important not only because it is the first public utterance by a leading statesman of the dual monarchy on the Balkan question, but because it gives the world indication of what Hungarians believe should be done with Serbia at the end of the war. It is their idea that Austria-Hungary should retain strategic positions that will prevent the Balkans from again kindling a world war.

"I personally do not believe that the Karagevitch dynasty which formerly ruled Serbia, should return," continued Count Apponyi. "The Karagevitch rulers organized permanent conspiracies against our safety, culminating in the assassination at Sarajevo of the Archduke Ferdinand, the act that precipitated the war. We cannot tolerate such rule again. Furthermore Bulgaria and Greece must be constructed into efficient powers. Bulgaria must obtain her rights in Macedonia."

Count Apponyi believes peace is not far distant.

"Before there can be effective steps to bring peace, there must be false steps. This period we are passing through now. The success of mediation does not hinge on the personality of the mediator, but upon the spirit in which mediation is offered."

"Those who have been considered as possible peacemakers—President Wilson, Pope Benedict, the King of Spain and the Queen of Holland—are all welcome as peacemakers, providing they bring real fairness and impartiality and advocating terms which can be accepted without our renouncing the necessary aims of defensive warfare. That means that we must have effective guarantees for the future safety of Europe."

"There is no doubt that we can hold out until the coming harvest. Then the economic situation will be completely altered, making it evident that we cannot be starved into surrendering. I do not think our enemies any longer entertain hopes of military success. We are convinced of the economic measures we have taken, too, then the time will be ripe for peace."

MEASURE INCLUDES ELECTRIC RAILROADS

WASHINGTON, June 12.—The supreme court decided the federal safety appliance regulations relating to trucks applied to electric as well as steam railroads operating in interstate commerce in affirming a verdict of \$7500 in favor of Edgar E. Campbell, injured motorman of the Spokane & Inland Railroad company, who figured in a collision between Spokane, Wash., and Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, in which 15 persons were killed.

1 MAN LOSES LIFE IN FIRE SWEEPING OIL COMPANY PLANT

STANDARD COMPANY'S STORAGE BUILDING IS SWEEP BY FIERCE BLAZE.

SEATTLE, Wash., June 12.—One man lost his life in a fire which destroyed the wharf of the Standard Oil Company's storage plant at Richmond Beach, 15 miles north of Seattle, late yesterday, causing a loss estimated at \$50,000.

The fire was caused by the explosion of an oil drum on the wharf, and quickly enveloped the structure, on which was stored 1000 drums of oil. Three men who were working on the wharf were forced to jump into the water when the flames swept the pier. James Farmer, one of the workmen, was drowned, but the other two men succeeded in reaching shore. For a time it was feared that the fire would spread to the huge oil tank in which thousands of barrels of fuel oil and gasoline are stored, but the arrival of two fireboats from Seattle saved the storage tanks. Two hours after the fire started it was reported under control.

The explosion which started the fire is believed to have been caused by spontaneous combustion.

TWO BAD HILLS WILL SOON BE IN REPAIR

LA GRANDE, Ore., June 12.—Kamela and Wallowa hills, both of which are persistently getting out of order and for the past month have been in bad shape, are to be repaired at once if the county court of Wallowa county lives up to agreement. On the Kamela hill, which is in bad shape, and which tourists cross thoroughly, there is to be a repair crew early next week. It is difficult to accomplish anything on that piece of road until the weather is settled and the county court now is making arrangements to prosecute extensive repairs and maintenance on that highway.

In Wallowa county, the big Wallowa hill has been in bad shape for some time. A month or so ago the county courts of the two counties agreed to stand half and half of the burden of the hill, the major portion of the historic incline being in Wallowa county since the readjustment of the boundary line by the last legislature. The Wallowa end of the agreement is probably getting ready to make the much-needed repairs at once although the hill has been dangerous in spots for some weeks. It is probable that a man will be put on the hill practically continuously, and the Kamela hill will likely get much the same treatment.

HUGHES WILL MARCH FOR PREPAREDNESS

WASHINGTON, June 12.—Charles Evans Hughes promised to march in the preparedness parade to be held here, provided business does not take him out of town on that day.

President Wilson, in response to an invitation from the arrangements committee, already has promised to head the parade, to review it from a stand in front of the White House and later to deliver an address on "America First."

The demonstration in which other higher officials are expected to take part, will be the principal feature of the capital's celebration of Flag day. The committee in charge of the parade was uncertain today what line of march would be assigned to Mr. Hughes.

Spanish Ruler Is Host.

NORMAN MACK ASKS HUGHES QUESTIONS

"Which is his sincere attitude? His silence when these elements were booming him for the nomination or his avowal of complete patriotism now that the nomination has been achieved?"

"What does he imply or charge when he says that he stands for 'An Americanism that knows no ulterior purpose'?"

"Whom does he accuse of ulterior purpose?"

"Is he hitting at President Wilson or ex-President Roosevelt? What would Mr. Hughes do to maintain the rights of American citizens that the president has not done?"

"Would he declare war on Germany or England or both?"

"Would he intervene in Mexico?"

Late Colonel Particular.

WASHINGTON, June 12.—The late Colonel John S. Mosby differed from many military men in that instead of being pleased at being given a higher designation than he was properly entitled to the conferring of the higher title was extremely obnoxious to him, remarked Henry D.
