Depression is General in Wheat

PORTLAND, Ore., June 13.—With extreme weakness in the domestic trade and serious depression for the day, both in spot and cargo offerings abroad, the local wheat trade is weak.

Transactions are nominal. In fact, there is not enough business in sight at the moment to base quotations in the country.

Millstuffs are being quoted steady by millers. While there is only a small demand, this is considered a very good thing. One of the leading millers asserted during the day that were it not for the good supply of grass and the lesser demand for stuffs, he would not know what to do. Stocks of millstuffs are the smallest in years.

Flour market is fairly steady around \$5, but trade continues rather dull.

Grain bag market is stagnant with expectations of buyers for lower price.

Broomhull cable from Liverpool that the cargo market was weak with pressure on Manitoba, winters 64 lower and Manitoba 56 1/2 lower; demand quiet. American shipments to United Kingdom liberal, native offers large and foreign situation favorable to buyers. Arrivals large and storage inadequate.

Argentine weather continues fine for planting, movement and receipts of all grain are plentiful. Tonnage is limited.

Total shipments from North America the past week: Wheat 9,782,000 bushels; corn 983,000 bushels; oats 3,332,000 bushels.

United Kingdom—Wheat on passage decreased 2,512,000 for the week.

SHORTAGE FORCES PRICE OF BERRIES TO \$1.50 PER CRATE

PORTLAND, Ore., June 13.—Strawberries were real scarce on the first day of the week. Both on the East Side Farmers' market and along the wholesale way, there was a great scarcity of offerings, and values responded accordingly.

On the Farmers' market parties representing Seattle and Puget Sound interests were eager buyers; in fact, took the bulk of the supplies at \$1.30 for ordinary to \$1.40 for best soft varieties.

Along Front street strawberries of best quality sold during the day at \$1.40 to \$1.50 generally, with poor fruit going fractionally below this.

Entrance of so many Puget sound buyers into the local field has naturally stimulated the price and buying. With a short crop already shown, the market quickly responded to the limited offerings. All hope for even moderately low strawberry prices this season has been given up by the local trade, and housewives might as well realize this fact now as later.

CATTLE MARKET IS DEPRESSED WITH A BIG SOUTHERN RUN

PORTLAND, Ore., June 13.—Thirty-seven loads of California cattle came upon the local market, as expected, for the week's opening. In general the market acted somewhat weaker, with values at least 15c lower, but in some instances sales were made a quarter off former figures.

Run of cattle available for the week's opening market at North Portland topped last Monday's offerings, and as the trade here has been somewhat over-supplied with southern stuff recently, the market naturally reacted.

General cattle market range: Choice grass steers, \$8.20 to \$8.35; ordinary to common steers, \$6.00 to \$7.00; choice cows, \$7.25; ordinary to common cows, \$5.00 to \$7.15; choice heifers, \$7.50; ordinary heifers, \$5.00 to \$7.25; choice bulls, \$5.50 to \$6.00; good to fair bulls, \$4.00 to \$5.00; ordinary to common bulls, \$2.00 to \$2.75; best light calves, \$8.00; good calves, \$7.00 to \$7.50.

Hog Market is Lower.

In the swine division the run over Sunday was but frequently less than the heavy run of last Monday. Total supply available for trade at the opening was 4232 head, compared with 4507 last Monday and 2630 head a year ago.

There was considerable weakness again shown in the trade at the start of the week, and killers were generally offering from \$8 to \$8.10 for top.

There was a lull in the buying at the start, and shippers were more willing to take the price than a week ago.

The swine market situation for the day was only fairly steady in the east. General hog market range: Choice light weights, \$8.10 to \$8.15; good light weights, \$8.00 to \$8.05; medium weights, \$7.50 to \$7.90; rough and heavy, \$7.50 to \$7.75.

Sheep Market is Steady.

General mutton and lamb market conditions at North Portland were considered steady for the day. There were quite fair shipments from the interior, with total offerings during the morning at 2559 head, compared with 668 head last Monday.

General shorn mutton and lamb range: Select spring lambs, \$9.00 to \$9.25; best yearlings, \$7.50 to \$7.75; good to common wethers, \$6.70 to \$7.00; best ewes, \$5.60; good to common ewes, \$5.00 to \$5.50.

CALIFORNIA THREAT FALLS ON DEAF EARS

PORTLAND, Ore., June 13.—"California might as well learn now as later that this state proposed to protect its fruit and vegetable industries, no matter how much the southern interests kick."

This statement was made during the day by State Inspector J. E. Stansberry, whose attention has been called on numerous occasions to threats made by the Californians as to what they would do with the products in this state if officials here dared to enforce existing laws for the protection of farm industries.

"I find," said Mr. Stansberry, "that the potato men of the south, who were complaining most bitterly of the action of this state in condemning tuber moth stock, are really the worst offenders. In fact they have persistently sent cars here without California state officials' inspection."

"I have just received word from the Oregon state board of horticulture that hereafter no shipments of California potatoes will be allowed to enter the markets of this state without a California inspection certificate attached. This rule will be rigidly enforced because its infringement means the protection of the Oregon industry."

"So far as the California officials' statements that they would condemn all shipments of Oregon apples with the slightest trace of scale, scab or worms, I would say that I never saw a shipment of any produce that I could not condemn for one cause or another. We have been very lenient with the California interests, but do not propose to have them dictate to us by threats or otherwise what we shall do for the protection of our farm industries."

"We are going to treat the Californians right, but are not going to let them run this state."

Butte Teamsters Strike.

BUTTE, June 13.—Members of the Teamsters' Union went on strike tying up all the coal yards in the city and in other respects adding to the embarrassment when the Workingmen Union went out more than a week ago. The teamsters demanded an increase of 50 cents a day. Milk and ice will be delivered as usual, through an agreement made last week.

Commission houses did not attempt to make deliveries. The transfer companies have sent their horses to pasture. More than 200 men are out on strike in Butte. The union strike committee refuses to recognize the Employer's Association and the latter maintains the position that strikers must eventually treat with them.

Exports Jump Millions.
WASHINGTON, June 10.—Exports of the United States in April were \$399,000,000 and imports \$217,000,000, as compared with exports in April, 1915, of \$294,000,000 and imports of \$160,000,000, the bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce announced.

Manufactured articles exported ready for consumption amounted to \$197,000,000 in April, compared with \$90,000,000 in the same month last year.

Sister's Will Contested.
SALEM, Ore., June 12.—Henry Bruck and Eva Monond, of Cologne, Germany, brother and sister, respectively of the late Mary Olschlager, filed notice in the Marion probate court, through their attorney, that they would contest their sister's will, which named Theresa Arnold of this county, as the sole beneficiary.

The contestants allege that undue influence was used by the beneficiary to persuade Mrs. Olschlager, who was an invalid, to give her the property. For many years before Mrs. Olschlager's death it appears that Theresa Arnold cared for her.

Gerard's Cattle Retracts.

BERLIN, June 13.—Count Friedrich von Westarp, conservative leader in the Reichstag, has accepted the statement of the American ambassador, James W. Gerard, that the interview which the ambassador was alleged to have given to a representative of the National Zeitung was a fabrication.

As a consequence, Count Westarp today published a statement withdrawing criticism of the American policy which he made in the Reichstag and which were based on the alleged interview.
