Burke and Charles Angel, are here today but others are expected tonight. The next sale date is at Heppner Saturday.

He intends working during the summer on his father's ranch in the south end of the county and in September will go to Newark, N. J., for the great A. A. U. track and field meet as a representative of Multnomah club of Portland.

Two More Surrender Licenses.

Mayor George Done and Fred Moss of Pilot Rock, yesterday afternoon entered pleas of guilty to charges of catching fish under the limit and were fined \$25 each and costs by Justice McReynolds. Each surrendered his fishing and hunting license and turned over his fishing tackle. Neither can fish or hunt during the remainder of the year and their tackle will be sold by the state. Only two of the men arrested for catching undersized fish, M. A. Sturtevant and P. G. Runkle, have not pleaded guilty.

CAVALRY ROUTS BANDITS.

Officials chosen will take office October - and immediately establish a civil government.

SAN ANTONIO, June 12.—Four companies of coast artillery, en route from the east, will be rushed to Eagle Pass, which has become a hotbed of anti-American activity. Funston announced.

AMERICAN HEADQUARTERS, Mexico, June 12.—Three and perhaps more, Mexicans were killed and several wounded when Captain Rether's cavalry detachment overtook and routed the remnant of Cervantes band early yesterday. No Americans were injured.

The Mexicans attempted to ambush the Americans in a heavily wooded canyon 20 miles northeast of Santa Clara. The cavalrymen dismounted and surprised the bandits on the flank. The Villistas kept up a heavy fire for a few minutes, but broke and fled when the Americans rushed them. The troops followed so rapidly that they prevented the bandits from reaching their horses or supplies. They escaped into the woods and rocky canyons, leaving 24 horses and their rifles and ammunition behind. There were about 20 men on each side of the fight.

Paving Plant Bought.

OREGON CITY, June 12.—The county court has ordered the purchase of a paving plant from the Columbia Diaper company for \$300. The plant has been used for the last two weeks in improving the Oregon City-Park place road under the direction of Paving Superintendent Worswick and Roadmaster Root. Besides the mixing plant the county secures five dump wagons and other minor equipment with the purchase.

ENGLAND, Ark., June 12.—Because he thought his wife was receiving letters from another man, Steve Ashcraft shot and killed a rural mail carrier, his wife and then himself. Witnesses at an inquest said that Ashcraft, who was a farmer, 40 years old had ordered Edward A. Davis, a mail carrier, not to deliver any mail to Mrs. Ashcraft, from whom he was separated.

As Davis was placing mail in the box of a farm where Mrs. Ashcraft was staying Ashcraft shot and killed him; then found Mrs. Ashcraft and killed her, and finally blew off the top of his own head.
