Dutch Ships Under Guard.
THE HAGUE, Holland, June 17.—The Dutch government has officially published the measures it will take to safe-guard Dutch shipping. These are:
1. A large tug boat with wireless installation and all safety appliances is to be permanently stationed close to the North Hinder lightship, where most of the "accidents" to Dutch ships have occurred.
2. All outgoing and incoming ships are to be escorted through the danger zone by mine sweepers and tugboats with wireless equipment on board.
3. The route around Scotland is recommended as less dangerous, but as there is not much enthusiasm for that route the government will do all in its power to insure the safety of those vessels that prefer to go via the British channel.
Although the government takes these measures, it disclaims any responsibility for the safety of the shipping, each vessel must bear its own risk. The measures were taken after prolonged conferences with ship owners, masters, officers and men of the merchant marine, and under these conditions officers and crews are ready to go to sea again.

Plains States and Upper Mississippi Valley—Generally fair and considerably warmer weather will prevail the first half of the week, the latter half will be cooler with probably local thundershowers.

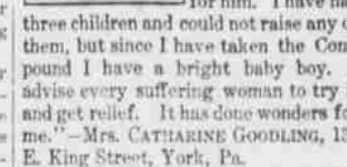
