### Marriage License Issued.

A marriage license was issued this afternoon to William Henderson Bailey of Milton and Retta E. Wombach of this city. They will be married this evening.

### Splinterman Nearly Recovered.

George Splinterman, the colored man recently shot through the body by C. E. Runyan is recovering rapidly now from his wound. He is still at the hospital but was able to sit up yesterday and eat a big meal.

### Sewer for Garden Street.

Upon recommendation of Chairman Kirkpatrick of the sewer committee the council last night voted to allow the petition asking for a sewer on Garden street between Bluff and Tustin. A petition asking for an arch light at the intersection of West Webb and Ara streets was referred to the light committee.

### Oregon Football Man Here.

Kenneth Bartlett of Estacada, who was a star member of the University of Oregon football team last season, arrived in Pendleton this morning to spend the summer in the harvest fields. Bartlett played tackle last year and expects to return to college this fall hardened by his work up here. He formerly lived at La Grande.

### Stay at Convention Short.

Though he arrived only last evening for the Christian church convention, Rev. Leon Meyers of the Dalles was forced to leave this morning. He received a subpoena requiring his presence in court at Eugene as a witness in a suit growing out of an accident which he chanced to see over a year ago. Rev. Meyers formerly lived in Eugene.

### To Enter Lewiston Tournament.

Four of Pendleton's best golfers, Brooke Dickson, George Hartman, W. L. Thompson and J. V. Tallman, will leave this afternoon in the Thompson car for Lewiston, Idaho, to participate in a golfing tournament in that city Saturday and Sunday. Three of Baker's best players will join them and the two cities will furnish one team to compete against Walla Walla and Lewiston. Mr. and Mrs. F. E. Judd and Miss Thelma Thompson will also drive up to witness the tournament.

### Hydrants Easily Broken.

Declaring that the use of fire hydrants for filling water tanks and flushing sewers is damaging the hydrants, Superintendent F. B. Hayes of the water department last evening asked the council to cooperate with the water commission in devising some means of preventing this. He suggested the installation of different kinds of hydrants for flushing purposes. The fire hydrants, he said, are very delicately constructed and easily broken so as to be unserviceable. He told of a number of cases where hydrants had been broken recently and referred to the Domestic Laundry fire which gained a big headway because of damage to a hydrant.

### Work on Church Resumed.

Work looking to the completion of enough of the Catholic church to make it serviceable until such time as the church can complete it according to the original plans has been begun and it is hoped to have the church ready for use by this fall. The original plans call for a very large church in the shape of a cross and will cost about \$75,000. Already about \$35,000 has been spent in putting up the stone walls and it is now planned to roof over that portion of it which forms the stem of the cross. This will give the church two and a half times the capacity of the present church and will be sufficient for the needs of the congregation for some years. In appearance it will be complete in its effect and, when the time comes, can be fully completed without tearing away any of the work now being done.

### La Dow Collection Added.

The collection of mounted animals and birds owned by G. I. LaDow is today being moved to the offices of Major Lee Moorhouse to be added to the famous Moorhouse museum. Mr. LaDow's collection of old guns is also being moved there.

### REMONSTRANCE MADE OVER LICENSING OF PEDLERS.

A remonstrance, signed by more than 300 residents of Pendleton, against the proposed ordinance to license professional peddlers in the city was presented to the city council last evening and was referred to the ordinance committee.

The remonstrators protest against the licensing of peddlers of fruits and vegetables. The ordinance as introduced provides for a license of \$3.00 per day or \$15 per week for peddlers but excludes those persons who are peddling fruits, vegetables or other products that they raise themselves.

However, it is said that most of the fruits and vegetables peddled here are not peddled by producers but by men who buy directly from the small farmers, making up a load, and bringing it to Pendleton. It is claimed by the remonstrators that many of the small farmers are unable to bring their own products to the city and that the ordinance would work a hardship upon them. The ordinance was read again last evening, but no action was taken upon it.

which yesterday held 4000 soldiers, caused the belief that the Mexicans intend to attack.

Hundreds of refugees crossed into El Paso this morning.

MEXICO CITY, June 22.—Pershing's defiance of the instructions of General Trevino caused the battle at Carrizal Station, Obregon announced. He said that the Mexicans fired upon the Americans under his orders. An official statement reported that the battle occurred on Sunday. The Americans were moving southward but were driven back. Seventeen were captured, General Gomez was killed in the battle.

EL PASO, June 22.—The Mexicans evacuated Juarez today. Early this morning two troop trains left Juarez loaded with Carrizalistas and civilians, riding atop the cars or hanging to the sides. It was expected that every soldier, except possibly a small guard, was going before night.

WASHINGTON, June 22.—Secretary of War Baker announced that he is endeavoring to move the California, Kansas and Missouri militia to the border immediately. They will comprise about 8000 troops and will start when their equipment is complete. Mobilization is not quite complete yet.

isters and religious workers to acquaint themselves and their communities with the services at their disposal and to cooperate with the college in its great work of rural betterment.

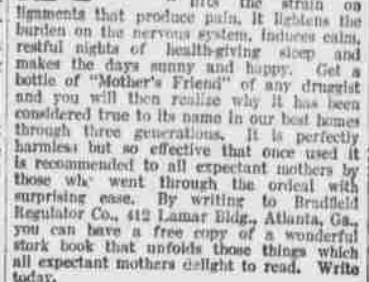
Professor Resler urged the interest and support of church people also in building up the rural schools. Just as the pastor is the greatest factor in the rural church, so is the teacher the supreme agency in the school. This teacher must be selected and trained with a view to permanent service in the rural community. This is not being done now by the high school training courses and cannot be for the reason that the best country teacher must be country-reared and in love with country life.

### Favors Normal School.

In a brief interview at noon today, Professor Resler expressed his approval of the initiative measure to establish a normal school in eastern Oregon. He believes that the interests of the rural schools will be served best by providing opportunities for high grade professional training within the reach of young men and women who have been reared in the country. Most of our young people will not travel far for higher education. The great territory in eastern Oregon needs an institution for the professional training of teachers and further delay in providing one means holding back the progress of the country schools, one of the chief factors in rural betterment.
