

World Trade Lower for Wheat

PORTLAND, Ore., June 23.—Further weakness was shown in the wheat trade at Chicago during the early trading of the day, and prices were lower, but values were generally depressed for all offerings.

Locally the market is marking time. Owing to war conditions there is no settled condition in the trade. Buyers are afraid to offer an advance for supplies, and holders are unwilling to sell except at higher figures, because they expect more.

In the meantime there is scarcely enough business passing at interior primary points to firmly establish prices.

Broomhall cabled from Liverpool that the wheat market was dull, with demand for both wheat and flour poor. Millers' stocks are large and arrivals continue liberal. Cargo market quiet and inclined lower. Winters 1-1-2d and Manitoba ad lower. Buyers here believe in continued free export offers. There was a further decline yesterday in the Atlantic freights.

United Kingdom—Weather is still unfavorable. France—Weather is mostly cool and damp. Warm weather urgently needed.

Russia—Weather is mostly favorable. Shipments are being made from Archangel, and the first full cargo of wheat cleared a few days ago for France. This represents accumulation at this port, and does not indicate free movement in export channels.

Top lambs are not really holding their own at \$8.75, although a few lots of small volume may be sold at this price.

All the big buyers are filled up with cattle, and they are not even interested at the moment. On the other hand, most of the late arrivals have lacked quality.

CARRANZA CALLS FOR MEXICAN VOLUNTEERS

SAN ANTONIO, June 22.—It is reported from sources in Neuvo Laredo regarded as reliable that Carranza Tuesday issued a decree calling upon all males between the ages of 15 and 30 years to volunteer for army service. Failure to volunteer, the decree states, will subject the individual to conscription with death the penalty of an effort to evade conscription.

It is stated, also, that Carranza has instructed General de la Garza, commanding at Neuvo Laredo, to make every effort to prevent bandits from crossing into the United States.

Boys Cause Much Grief

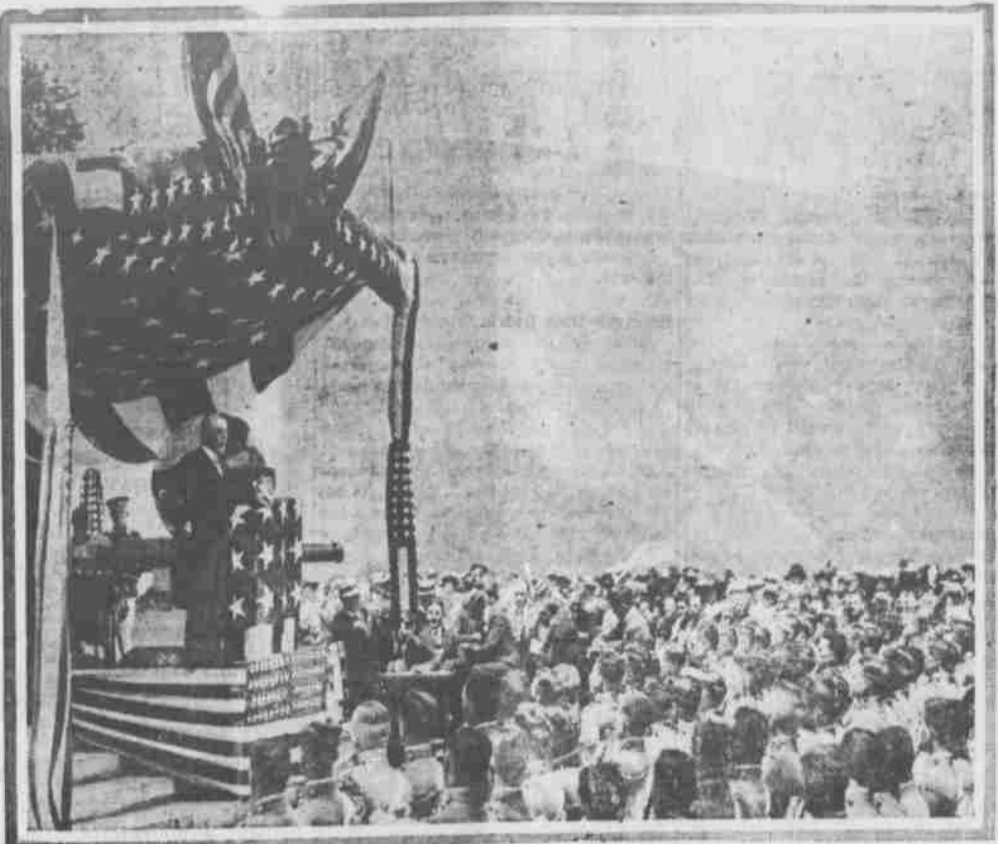
PITTSBURG, June 20.—John Shields, 9, of 607 Emlyn street, and Joseph Maslovits, 5, of 814 Middle street, surreptitiously visited Exposition Park circus grounds the other night and thereby caused anguish to their families, the seizure of much gasoline by police automobiles, and the arrest of a party of gypsies. All the trouble followed when a report was circulated that gypsies had kidnaped both boys.

It was about 6:30 when a little girl ran into the Allegheny police station and told the sergeant that she had seen gypsies throw two boys into a wagon. At about the same time George Maslovits, 5, ran to his mother and told her that his brother, Joseph, and the Shields boy had been taken by "the circus."

As there were three wagons in the gypsy outfit, the supposition was that the gypsies were the boy's idea of a circus. The police were notified again and the Allegheny station patrol and one from Central station went to the "rescue." The north side police captured one wagon and the central car continued on to McKees Rocks, where a gypsy camp was searched. At 8 o'clock the boys, tried and hungry, walked home and calmly announced that they had been to the circus grounds.

2 Children Die in Fire. SPOKANE, Wash., June 23.—Hazel Smith, 4 years old, and two brothers, August, 4 years old, and Walter, aged 7, were burned to death in their beds here while their mother, Mrs. J. L. Smith, is in a hospital in a critical condition as the result of her efforts to save the children.

Secretary of State Desvergne said today that war between two friendly nations would be very lamentable to Cuba, especially so as one nation, the United States, was more to Cuba even than a friend, for which reason it would be necessary to establish rigorous neutrality.

Gresham Extends Limits

GRESHAM, Ore., June 20.—The special election here for the purpose of annexing certain property on the western boundary of the town, carried by a vote of 54 to 12. Fifty-two votes were cast in the town for the annexation and the 12 against were cast by residents, while two in favor and none against were cast in the district to be annexed.
