DEPUTIES KILL MINER IN MINNESOTA STRIKE

VIRGINIA, Minn., June 23.—John Miner, striking Austrian miner, was killed and Wenzel Atlas, another striking miner, was wounded by deputies when the miners attempted to prevent strikebreakers starting work at the Alpena mine.

Policeman Is Brutal

KANSAS CITY, June 23.—A policeman, keyed up for his work of guard-

ing the Meyer building, between Twenty and Twenty-first streets on Grand avenue, assaulted and dangerously injured Levi Collins, a negro, as he was going to his work at Fred Harvey's at Union Station.

Collins started to cross the Grand avenue viaduct. He pushed his way through a crowd of striking union men until he was stopped by a patrolman who had been up about 11 o'clock.

Collins said he was going to work and told where he was employed.

The patrolman raised his club and knocked Collins down. He got up, staggering and trembling, but the club man sent him to the pavement. Another patrolman who knew Collins took him away from the one who was beating him and sent him to the Union Station.

H. L. Benjamin, of the Fred Harvey Company, demanded an explanation. He was told that Collins had "cursed the patrolman." Mr. Benjamin said he did not believe Collins was abusive. Benjamin said he would file a complaint with the board of police commissioners.

High Posts Are Desired

TOKIO, Japan, June 23.—The Yomiuri, of Tokio, offered its congratulations upon the solution of the double nationality problem by the ex-

patriation bill that passed both houses of parliament and has been promulgated to go into effect in a few months.

That journal expresses its regrets that a section of the Japanese, those who "are mere slaves of a narrow patriotism," do not welcome the new measure.

Such a section, it seems to believe that expatriation of Japanese means disloyalty to the throne. The paper, however, insists that making Japanese into good American citizens is a thing to be welcomed from the broader standpoint of the development of the Yamato race.

If Japanese become American citizens, the paper says, "the time may come when some of them will become congressmen, members of the cabinet or even president. That should be a cause for pride, and such a turn of affairs would prove the friendly relations between the two Pacific nations."

Five Killed in Explosives Plant

FERRY SOUND, Ont., June 23.—At least five workmen were killed and 20 seriously injured here in an explosion, followed by fire, in the plant of the Canadian Explosive Company, Limited.

CARRANZA SAID TO GET ENCOURAGEMENT FROM THE GERMANS

REPRESENTATIVES OF KAISER REPORTED TO SUPPORT PRESENT ATTITUDE.

German Citizens in Mexico Said to Be Treated With the Greatest Consideration. Property Is Not Molested. Several Names Mentioned in Connection With Affairs.

WASHINGTON, June 24.—Advice received here from Mexico alleges that the German representatives there have encouraged General Carranza and the officers of the de facto government in their opposition to United States troops remaining in that country. The form of encouragement was said to have been moral rather than material.

The report further declares that German citizens in Mexico are being treated with great consideration, their property not being molested. Some Americans have taken advantage of the favors accorded German subjects by placing their property in the hands of German friends upon leaving Mexico.

This information was disclosed by a competent authority in connection with information concerning the activity in Mexican affairs of Captain Franz von Rintelen, now under indictment in New York for conspiracy to foment strikes in American munitions plants and under arrest in England.

Von Rintelen is known by the authorities mentioned as well as by government officials to have been most active in Mexican affairs. His activities began at the Villa and Carranza were at odds, and when Carranza went to the border to direct a plot to gain control of the government.

The information obtained leads officials to believe that Von Rintelen thought that by starting a dispute between the United States and Mexico, munition shipments from America would be stopped, that the United States would be too busy to pursue the submarine controversy, and that the allied navies would be prevented from securing fuel oil and gasoline from the Mexican fields. More than 50 per cent of the oil used in the British navy comes from Mexico.

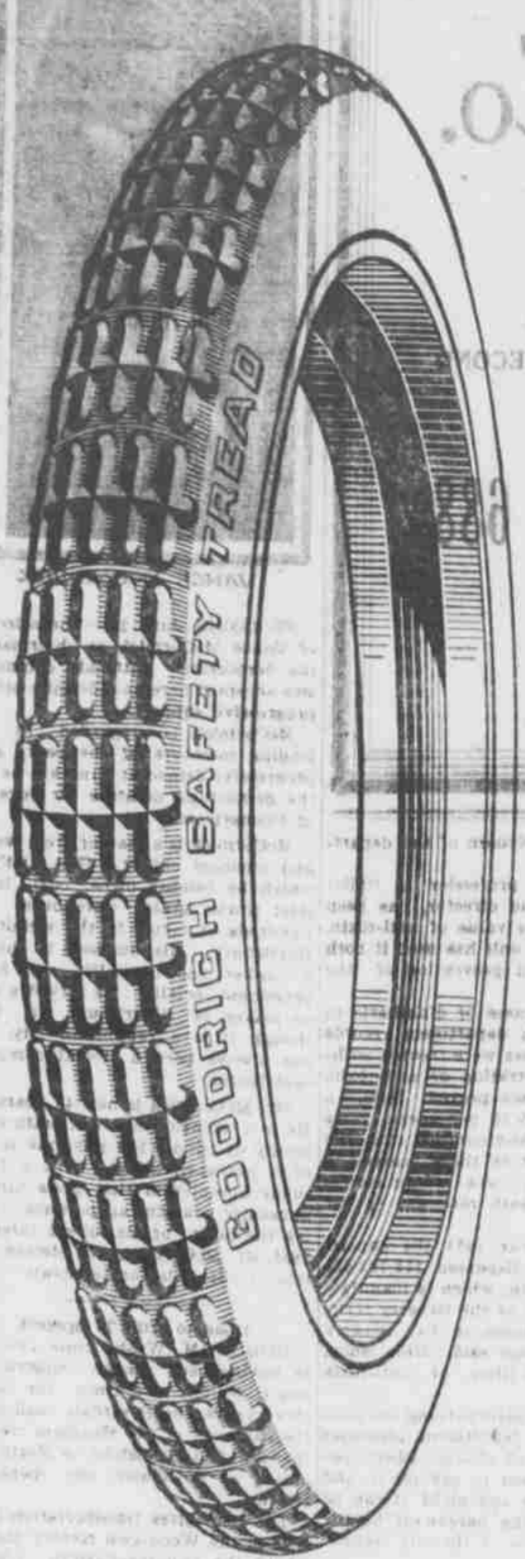
It was pointed out that at no time would the United States have failed to press its demands in regard to the conduct of submarine warfare, even if a state of war existed with Mexico. As for exportation of oil from Mexican fields, it was said that in the event of war between the United States and Mexico, some means will be found to prevent the plans of Von Rintelen from being realized.

The names of Frederico Stallforth, of New York, a former banker in Mexico, and Andrew C. Mejoy, also of New York, are mentioned in connection with that of von Rintelen. Stallforth who was said to have been associated with von Rintelen, in Mexico, was called before the federal grand jury in New York to testify as to his activities.

Mejoy also was associated with von Rintelen in Mexico. He was indicted in New York on the charge of having obtained a false passport for von Rintelen.

Another name mentioned with von Rintelen's was that of David Lamar, sometimes called "the wolf of Wall Street" and indicted with him. Lamar is said to have furnished a large sum of money from von Rintelen to be used in promoting certain plans regarding Mexico, and dock strikes in New York. So far as it is known in Washington, Lamar performed no services commensurate with the sum of money he is said to have received.

RUSSIAN REVERSES REPORTED BY BERLIN

BERLIN, June 23.—Continuing their successful counter-offensive against the Russians, German troops have captured positions between Sobul and Tielowka, repelling enemy counter-attacks, the war office announced. On both sides of the river Turlja, the Russians have been driven back.

Russian attacks southwest of Rostochin and Koidi failed. Other enemy attacks near Hirsowenka and Rohlbinen were repelled, the Staff suffering heavy losses.
